CURRENCY OF THE CITY.

A marriage license was issued yesterday to Thomas Premie and Helene Bunz.

Judge Brill refused to grant a new trial in the case of Margaret McDonald against the city of St. Paul.

S. B. Mahan has commenced an action against Frank Agnew to recover \$700 upon a promissory note.

Judge Brill rendered judgment for \$300 in favor of the Standard Oil company against Jacob Hoffman et al.

The many friends of C. Forbes Calland will be pained to hear of his sudden death, which occurred March 11 at St. Paul.

Frankot & Co. have announced an action against the Bleibhauser Hardware company to enforce a mechanic's lien for \$18.81.

John F. Angel has commenced an action against P. H. McDonnell, John J. Giefer and Peter Enders to recover \$24 upon a promissory note.

Melchias Schaefer has commenced an action against Mahlon D. Miller and Robert L. Wharton to recover \$5,000 upon a promissory note.

John F. Angel has announced an action against John J. Giefer and Peter Enders to recover \$175 for rent of a house used as a meat market.

The case of Johanna Kuehke against The City of St. Paul, to recover \$800 alleged damages to a building by reason of the caving in of a street, is on trial before a jury in Judge Gies' court.

James Connors, the Clifton hotel waiter who took a jump over the bluff near the St. Paul roller mill early yesterday morning, is not as badly hurt as reported. Last evening he was up and around, with nothing but a few bruises to show for his fall.

In the cases of Bengt Swanson and A. Norden, who appealed to the district court from the assessments made by the board of public works in the matter of change of grade on Burr street, Judge Kelly has affirmed the proceedings and assessments made.

In the case of McGuigan & Schenelle against Harriet J. Hadley, Judge Brill has issued an order deciding that McGuigan & Schenelle are entitled to judgment for the sum of \$29.80, and that the real estate of Hadley be sold to satisfy the same.
