M. Anderson was examined by Judge Morrison yesterday and ordered committed as an insane person. He was taken to Rochester last evening.

Peter McHugh, one of the pioneer settlers of Rosemount, died his home at that village yesterday morning. His funeral will take place on Friday.

Scarlet fever at 297 West Third, Highwood station and 206 Grove, died at 8:27 East Seventh and 693 Cook; five marriages, fifteen births and one death, was the health office report yesterday.

M. Stevens, a printer, fell down a stairway at 35 East Fifth street yesterday morning, and was pretty badly hurt. He is forty-five years of age. Stevens was taken to the city hospital in the Central pathology.

The report of the board of the United States supreme court in the milk and switching cases is still a lively topic of discussion. The members of the board say that by slightly amending the Minnesota law it will conform to the decision.

The plan for granting certificates for perfect attendance at teachers' institutes and faithful performance of duties assigned is reported by the state superintendent of public instruction to be giving great satisfaction. Reports from the institutes recently held at Preston, Luverne and Fairmont show that they were highly successful.

The druggists of the city have formed an association for the protection of their interests. It will be known as the Ramsey County Pharmaceutical association, and the officers are Lathrop Mussetter, president; Adolph Hiesh, first vice president; G. A. Gotwald, second vice president; S. R. McMaisters, secretary, and W. A. Frost, treasurer.

The secretary of state recorded the following incorporation yesterday: The Carpenter, Nevens Electric Heating company, of Minneapolis, with a capital stock of \$300,000. The highest amount of indebtedness at any one time is limited to \$100,000. The incorporators are F. W. Nevens, Charles G. Carpenter, M. F. Schofield, John W. Kelly, L. Kimball and Robert T. Lang, all of Minneapolis.

Officer Harrey Meyerding last night arrested a couple on the corner of Seventh and Jackson streets for disorderly conduct. They were the names of C. H. Wells and Eddie Jackson. They were together and at the corner she insisted on going one way, while he was determined upon the other. Their quarrel attracted quite a crowd of curious spectators who enjoyed the war of words.

Carl Passig, the plumber and gasfitter who did business on Third street, and disappeared from South St. Paul several weeks ago, leaving numerous creditors in Alabama. A recent issue of the Florence Herald has this to say: "Carl Passig, of St. Paul, Minn., is in the city and is a guest of Frank Brent. Mr. Passig is a practical engineer and plumber of several years' experience, and is desirous of locating in Florence."

As the time approaches, interest in the National Educational association convention increases in all parts of the country. Hon. C. C. Davidson, manager of the National Educational association, who was in the city yesterday, arranging for state headquarters and hotel accommodations for a delegation from his state. Mr. Davidson said there would be 500 Ohio teachers at St. Paul during the July convention.

The Ninth Ward Republican club met at Ackerman's hall last night in pursuance of the adjournment from last Saturday evening. The meeting of last night lacked the exciting incidents of the previous meeting, besides there was but a small attendance. Henry Hinkens, the man who created so much excitement by the catching he received at Saturday's meeting, was recommended for the nomination for ward alderman.

Charles A. Clark has resigned his commission as second lieutenant of Company E, First infantry, M. N. G., and J. T. Thurman that of second lieutenant of Company I, same regiment, and their resignations have been accepted. Lieut. Clark has left the city, and the term of service of Lieut. Thurman has expired. Commissions were issued yesterday to Robert L. Winne as first lieutenant, Company H, First infantry, and Joseph Magnin captain of the same company.

At the adjourned meeting of the state executive committee of the Railway Employees' club reports were received from clubs throughout the state. All the delegates present spoke enthusiastically of the work done and to be done by the club, and the reports show the members to be in a healthy and prosperous condition. The Australian system of voting was explained by C. B. Branson, and he was tendered a vote of thanks for his address. Harry J.
