Panitz Willing to Sell His Country to Russia for a Price.

LONDON, May 31.—Since the day when John Reynolds Pakul, ambassador from Peter the Great to the states of Germany, was captured by Charles XII. of Sweden, and broken on the wheel, Russian court practice has not received a more startling blow than the conviction and sentence to death of Maj. Panitz, the Russian agent in a conspiracy against Prince Ferdinand of Bulgaria.
