A MONDAY MELANGE.

The state board of regents meet to-day at the capitol.

The South St. Paul distillery yesterday exported 150 barrels of spirituous liquors.

They Are Heavily in Debt, But Propose to Hold On.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 15.—A secret meeting of the stockholders of the Athletic Base Ball club was held this afternoon to take action regarding the financial difficulties.

Manager William Barrie, of Baltimore, was present as the representative of the American association. He stated to the meeting that he was instructed to inquire what measures the stockholders proposed to adopt with reference to the discontinuance of the club.

In reply to this interrogation it was understood that assurance was given that the affairs of the club would be straightened out and that the club would play its scheduled games for the season.

Secretary Whitaker, of the Athletic club, stated to the meeting that the indebtedness of the club was in round figures \$16,000, including \$2,500 due for players' salaries.

A financial committee of six was appointed to devise means whereby this sum, or a portion of it, could be raised. This committee will report to an adjourned meeting to be held on Friday night.

At the conclusion of the meeting several of the stockholders told the reporters that they would hold the debt be paid and the season would be in the field next year and probably for many years to come.

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Eight month permits, \$17,050. Total, 22 buildings, \$46,925. EXORBITANT GAS RATES. Cause a Movement to Forfeit Charters in Chicago.

CHICAGO, Sept. 15.—A bill to forfeit the charters of the Chicago Gas Light and Coke company, the Consumers' Gas, Fuel and Light company, the Consumers' Gas company, the Equitable Gas Light and Fuel company, of Chicago, and the Chicago Gas company, was filed this noon in the circuit court of Cook county by Corporation Counsel Hutchinson, on behalf of the city of Chicago as complainant.

The charge is that they illegally combined under the title of the Chicago Gas Trust, the number of which was subsequently changed to the Chicago Gas company, for the purpose of suppressing competition and creating a monopoly with the result that the city and individual consumers are charged exorbitant rates for gas.

The court is asked to forfeit the charters granted by the city of Chicago to the four companies and the trust; to set aside the transfer of stock from the four companies to the trustees to perpetually enjoin the companies from further exercising and enjoying the privileges granted by the city.

Costs High to Vote. NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—The police commissioners held a long secret session to-day to consider how much money will be required for election expenses under the new ballot law. It was said that the election would cost the city about \$450,000, or \$150,000 more than last year under the old law.
