CAUGHT IN COURT.

In the cause of H. W. Armstrong & Co. against the St. Paul & Pacific Coal and Iron company, Judge Wilkin refused to grant a new trial.

Hart & Hilger have commenced an action against Henry Sontise, Louis Gaultier and Henry Lauer to enforce a mechanic's lien for \$175 on lot 6, block 3, in Woodland Park addition.

The Wisconsin Red Pressed Brick company has commenced an action against F. J. Rumer and others to enforce a mechanic's lien for \$272.20 on lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8 of Summit Terrace.

TRY IT ON THE JAP.

A Foreigner Under Sentence of Electrocuting.

New York, Sept. 16.—Lawyer Roger M. Sherman, who has interested himself in the case of Shihruja Jagera, the condemned Japanese murderer who is in solitary confinement in Sing Sing prison under sentence to be electrocuted, has decided to appeal to the United States supreme court from Judge Lacombe's recent decision in the United States circuit court in refusing a writ of habeas corpus. Judge Lacombe made an order to-day permitting the appeal to be taken, and directed that all the papers in the case before him be forwarded to Washington. The new session of the United States supreme court begins on the second Monday of next month.
