It is in order that there may be no misunderstanding of the registration law, City Attorney Russell's explanation of the same is here published.

"The judges of election are directed by the law to enter in the new registers, prepared by them for use at the coming election, the names of all persons appearing on the poll list in their district at the last preceding election as having voted, except such as are removed from the list, or become disqualified."

"Any person who did not vote at the last election in this city, and whose name does not appear on the poll list, may have his name entered there by personally appearing before the judges."

"If a person presents himself for registration, and it appears by his answers or otherwise known to the board of registry that he has not voted at the last election in this city, and whose name does not appear on the poll list, he may have his name entered there by personally appearing before the judges."
