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P. B. WINSTON.

The Minneapolis Tribune made a holy show of itself in its yesterday's issue, by printing a whole page of pictures and scurrilous correspondence, which were intended to be an argument against the election of Mr. Winston to the mayoralty, on the ground that it is the policy of the Republican party in Minneapolis to exclude immigration and to shut out men of brains and character because of their nativity.

There is no man in the city of Minneapolis who stands higher in the estimation of his fellow citizens than PHILIP B. WINSTON. He owes his prominence to merit alone.
