

SHEOLDS DISCOVERED

It Is Said to Be Located on a Small Island Called Paradise.

In the year 1859 an Englishman who had been a resident of New Zealand for some years suddenly blossomed out as an inspired leader of men. His name was Benjamin Marks, and he was anything but secure and refined. His idea was to secure power and place for himself, but he was so cocked at dissembling that no one suspected him until too late.

By visions, prophecies and downright lying he induced sixty-five people to set out with him in search of a paradise on earth. A brig called the True carried the crowd away from New Zealand in the month of July. She had come out from England several years before, and had been sailing between New Zealand and some of the islands to the north. It was left Poverty Bay. It was fifteen years old and a stout lad for his age.

The first stop was made at Sunday Island, which then had about 600 inhabitants. There was neither law, order nor decency among them. The crew managed to keep the crew from his people. From a trading schooner there he got such information as induced him to change the course and head for the group of islands known as the Paumotu group. This group takes in—large and small—about 2,000 islands, and is situated between Brazil and Australia, and is from 6 to 30 degrees south of the equator. We had six vessels sailing after leaving Sunday Island, and there were frequent quarrels among the crew. One morning we sighted land ahead, and before noon the people had forgot all their differences and were happy as children. The island was a new chart as Tatal, but we came to know it as Paradise. We came to it about 10 o'clock, and the crew and others were rowed ashore for a visit of inspection. The island is thirteen miles long by seven broad, but a mile or so at either end is low and sandy, and covered by heavy brush. There is also a large marsh on the eastern shore. After lunch we went to the beach, and Marks declared that the island would be a fine place to live. It was thickly wooded, had many fruit trees and the land gradally sprung to a plain a high and low, and was near the equator there was scarce need of clothing, and water would be known only by three or four wells of rain.

It took us about a week to disembark, and I was not only one of our party, but I was also a member of the crew. When the ship had been cleared and everything was ready for sailing, the captain of the brig, whose name was Darrwood, and who was a kind to me, ordered me into the yawl with another of the crew to pull him back to a landing. The crew had been forgotten. I noticed that the boat had her mast and sail lying in her, but his fact had no significance to me just then. The people had been rowing a fishing ground, a mile from the landing, and as we reached the shore I was informed by a landing party that the men and women had been killed, and two children had been wounded, and the entire party now prayed to be taken off the island. The crew had been made with the trader, and all were loaded up and taken to one of the Navigator Islands, where some of them are still living.
