AN OPENING.

The Bazaar for the Benefit of City Mission Work Ready for Business.

To-night the grand opening of the Christmas bazaar takes place. The bazaar occupies the store room at 623 and 625 Nicollet avenue, between Sixth and Seventh streets, and is held for the benefit of city mission work.

The bazaar includes in its departments fancy articles and Christmas novelties. A very fine line of books of every description, dolls, mechanical toys, confectionery, fruits, nuts, hardware and tinware, tools and housekeepers' articles, artificial flower ornaments and decorations, beautiful glassware and specimens of art handiwork.

The reading rooms have been a great feature of the library. At some hours of the day, in the afternoon and evening, there are from 200 to 300 persons in the reading rooms.

There are twelve societies now meeting at the library. One is devoted to literature, two to literature in part, two to medicine, one to dentistry, one to science, two to art, and the others embracing various fields.
