Progress of the Preparations for the Six-Day Walking Match.

There is a Probability That Littlewood's Record Will Be Beaten.

The Biggest Field Ever Gathered in the West Will Start.

Prominent Features in the Records of Some of the Starters.

One week from to-night at exactly 12 o'clock the word "go" will be pronounced by the starter of the great six-day pedestrian match in Washington.

He Will Not Secure a Re-Election as One of the Park Board.

Patrick Ryan Proposes an Important Addition to the Park System.

Report of the Special Committee on the Cost of the Court House.


A Sharp Reply to Rev. D. J. Burrell -- The Special Term Grand.

Yesterday the new park board organized, but left the election of a president in abeyance until the next meeting. All of the new members of the board were present and seemed to fall gracefully into their places. There was a goodly attendance also of interested citizens, who came to see how the new members

ITS TOTAL COST. Estimate of What the City Hall and Court House Will Cost.

Charles P. Preston, secretary of the board of court house and city hall commissioners, has addressed a communication to H. B. Dorelius, secretary Hennepin county legislative delegation, setting forth the actual and estimated cost of the new building, and the financial resources of the commission. A detailed estimate of the cost of the structure was prepared for the delegation by a special committee of the board of commissioners composed of Messrs. Marek, Johnson and D. LaFollette. The committee states that of the entire estimated cost of the building, \$2,458,627.97, the sum of \$855,519.82 is work actually completed, and for the latter part of the sum of \$457,081.45 is for completing the superstructure of the building after the present contract is completed. The board has a provisional contract, by the terms of which the contractors are bound to complete the superstructure for the latter sum, if directed to do so by the board. Of the total estimate the sum of \$63,137.25 is already actually expended in expenses, architect's fees, etc., making a total actual cost of \$1,386,698.52, leaving as an estimate but \$1,071,929.45.

contests ever seen in the country. There is no reason why it should not be, and every cause for expecting that it will be most exciting. The entries are all men of tried powers. All the conditions are favorable. The referee, starter and other officers have not yet been decided on, but will be selected early this week. The board is composed of the following representatives of the council, they being on the committee of public grounds and buildings: Mayor Winston is a park commissioner by virtue of his official position. Just after election, the Minneapolis Tribune, the only paper, according to itself, truly loyal to Minneapolis, took occasion to sneer at Patrick Ryan, one of the park commissioners-elect. Mr. Ryan, on his first appearance as a park commissioner yesterday, made the most effective reply to that sneer, by bringing before the board one of the most important matters yet presented to that body. It contemplates an important improvement in the park system. The proposition was explained by Prof. Cleveland, who drew the plans. This proposed extension of the park system includes the establishment of a boulevard on Second street, southeast from Central avenue, down to and through the university campus, thence along the west bank of the river to the Washington avenue bridge, out to street a short distance, thence down the river to the county line, following the road which now skirts the high bluff overlooking the Mississippi. Under Mr. Ryan's plan the land between the boulevard and the water's edge, below the Washington avenue bridge, would also be parked. Just beyond on the county line, where this boulevard and a super-surrounding land and finds it a dense clay soil, which he believes would be possible the conversion of that marsh into one of the most beautiful lakes in Minnesota, the marsh being caused by the presence of a super-saturated soil. His idea is to gain the cooperation of St. Paul in completing this work. The matter was referred to the special committee on park extension. Should the board take up that work, a driveway and park second to none in the north-west would result. The Farnsworth Loan and Realty company, which owns much of the land along the east bank of the river, has expressed a willingness to help out the project.

engines and dynamo for electric lighting are not included in the list of details, and the item of the cost of plantings does not provide for that work in the sub-basement, or above the fifth floor. The board believes the estimates of the cost of the building as far as it is possible for estimates to be, and adds that its experience in letting contracts so far have been that the work was a trifle less than estimated by the architects. It is impracticable to make an estimate of the cost of furnishing the building so far as to provide for its completion, and, therefore, no figures are given the estimate for the item of furnishing. Considerable expense will be required in reducing the original estimate of the cost of interior finishing and decoration, without in any manner lessening the quality of the building. If in the future it is decided to beautify the building, it can be done at a cost of \$100,000 or \$150,000. George Artwright was born at Bilton, Eng., in 1849. He is 5 feet 6 1/2 inches tall and weighs 140 pounds. He holds the world's championship for 50 miles and 58 minutes. At Madison Square Garden he was second in a six-day race once, won 245 miles and fourth once with 535 miles. William Nolan, a native of Dublin, Ireland, is one of the best of them. He came to Pittsburg in 1883, and worked at his trade, steam fitting, until 1870. In that year, at Baltimore, he won the championship of Western Pennsylvania, at twelve hours a day, covering 342 miles. In 1877, at Kansas City, he walked, heel and toe, 338 miles in a night and day race, getting second place, six miles behind the winner. At Cleveland, O., Christmas eve, 1888, he won a six-day race, covering 500 miles, beating Guerrero, Hart and Moore. He has finished several times in second place.

ALNOW A WINNER. He May Issue Processes to Whom He Lists. The case of Henry Alnow, clerk of the municipal court, came up yesterday before Judge Pond. The proceedings were brought on a writ of mandamus to force him to issue processes to constables designated by the attorneys. Assistant City Attorney Simpson appeared for Clerk Alnow, and an answer had already been made to the order. Mr. Brann takes his stand under the general law which provides that executions may be served by the sheriff or constables. The clerk takes his position under the special enactment creating the court and under the rule laid down about a year ago by the judges of the court. It maintains that it was an arbitrary ruling of the judges and that the judges and their predecessors that the enactment provides especially for a very important, and that the special enactment supersedes the general law. There are three police officers served and paid a salary by the city to provide all processes going out of the court. The fees they receive go into the city coffers. In case the constable serves the fees go into his pocket. The clerk maintains that it was an arbitrary ruling of his own, but the rule of the court, made as a matter of economy. Judge Pond decided in favor of the clerk, stating that municipal court officers should have the privilege of designating what officers should serve the papers. If the officers of the court were ready they should have to serve. He also stated that if the judges of the municipal court did not have jurisdiction over their own affairs, it was time that steps were taken to give it to them.

H. O. Messier is a rugged New Englander, born at Biddiford, Me., twenty-nine years ago. He is of French descent. He is an easy trotter and a fast walker, having several times shown his heels to W. A. Hoagland, the long-distance champion walker of America. Within the past two months he has taken two third prizes, one at Detroit and the other at the recent St. Louis race. He did 529 miles at Detroit, and 503 at St. Louis. He has won many night and day heel-and-toe races. He expects to do at least 500 miles in this race. Sam Day was born on the banks of the Thames, in 1847. He stands 5 feet 2 1/2 inches high, but is every inch an athlete. In 1870, '70 and '71 he steered in the champion four-oared crew of England, and also achieved considerable reputation as a sprinter. The first six-day race he started in was the first one won by the famous Dan O'Leary. He has held the 72-hour championship belt of England, beating Littlewood, also the 75-hour and 14-hour walking championships. Among those who has defeated is the late Harry Vautin. Tommy Cox was born twenty-eight years ago in Bradford, Pa., the heart of the oil region, and must have absorbed a good deal of the oleaginous fluid, for he moves so easily. He is five feet nine inches in height and tips the beam at 145. He is a very fast runner and a good walker. He once ran a few laps over 70 miles in twelve hours, and has covered 600 miles several times in six-day contests. He has won seventy-five hour races at Wheeling, W. Va., Parkersburg, W. Va., Columbia, Pa., Easton, Pa., and Atlanta. Martin Moran, born in Philadelphia, is the youngest pedestrian to pass the 500 mark. He is only twenty-one years old and as sound as a standard dollar. He is out to beat Littlewood's record. He is five feet six inches high and the marvel of the profession. He has taken second and fourth prizes in two Detroit races, finishing next to Tom Howarth in the first, and fourth at Pittsburg. He has won four hard seventy-two hour matches.
