

GUARDED ALL ROUND.

Carefully Prepared Synopsis of the Bell Charter, to Go Into Effect May 1.

How the Double-Headed Council Will Proceed to Get in Its Deadly Work,

And the Penalties City Officials Will Suffer for Negligence of Duty,

As Well as a Multitude of Other Provisions for the City's Welfare.

The Bell charter, which was signed Tuesday by Gov. Merriam, goes into force May 1. The main features of the new charter are those providing for the new dual common council, consisting of the mayor and four city commissioners, and the powers of creating contracts and ordinances for the various boards and departments of the city government.

The Double-Header.

Section 1 provides that on and after May 1, 1917, the city shall be governed by a dual common council, consisting of the mayor and four city commissioners. The mayor shall be elected by the people of the city for a term of two years.

Treasury Department.

Section 5 of chapter 1 of the charter provides that the city shall have a treasury department, which shall be headed by a treasurer, who shall be elected by the common council for a term of two years.

Taxation.

All real and personal property in the city, except such as is exempt by state law, shall be subject to taxation for the support of the city government, and the city shall have the right to levy taxes for the support of the city government.

City Controller.

The city controller shall be elected by the common council for a term of two years, and shall be the chief financial officer of the city. He shall be responsible for the collection of taxes and the disbursement of city funds.

Certificates.

As soon as the tax estimate has been made, the council may issue certificates of indebtedness for the purpose of raising money to pay the taxes. The council may also issue certificates of indebtedness for the purpose of raising money for other city purposes.

Improvements.

All applications and propositions for improvements, except public parks, must be submitted to the common council. The council may order the improvement to be made, and may assess the cost of the improvement on the property benefited.
