RUDINI IS MILD. PACIFIC ADVICES RECEIVED IN WASHINGTON. WASHINGTON, April 3.—It is said to-night that the president and his advisers are very much gratified over the receipt of the latest message from Premier Di Rudini, which was a subject of consideration at the cabinet meeting to-day.

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CURRIER BILL KILLED.

The House Knocks the Life Out of the Famous Railroad Bill.

Probability That Legislators Will Get Down and Agree Upon a Compromise.

The World's Fair Appropriation Again Sliced by the Alliance Members.

And at \$50,000 Receives the Final Indorsement of Nearly All.

Perhaps the man who yields more influence in the present house of representatives is Hon. H. C. Stevens. If there be any one to question this statement, his attention need be drawn to a very dramatic incident in the house when the Currier bill was up for discussion.

Yea—48. Nays—85. The members of the house yesterday afternoon voted upon the Currier substitute bill for House File 63. This bill, as is generally known, reorganizes the present railroad law, and proposes to bring into what is termed the distance tariff.

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
