DOES THIS SETTLE IT?

Sidney T. Klein Favors the Building of the Spirit Island Dam. There is no longer any doubt as to the location of the Spirit Island dam. Since after the Pillsbury-Washington Milling company secured control of the Spirit Island Water Power company, the company began to figure on a dam across the river at Spirit Island. The project was approved upon and only awaited the ratification of the directors of the Spirit Island Water Power company. A. Pillsbury and W. D. Washburn both approved the project. Recently Sidney T. Klein, one of the members of the committee, came to Minneapolis to examine into the enterprise. He has been found to be a committee officer outlining the proposed improvement and commending it. The work in the dam will be begun in the fall. Engineer W. L. De La Barre is already at work upon plans and surveying will begin in a few days. The improvement will cost \$1,000,000. In addition \$100,000 will be spent in improving the locks. The woodwork will be replaced by steel masonry.
