The park board met yesterday afternoon with Commissioner Winston in the chair, President Haugan being still absent from the city.

Alfred J. Dean, on the behalf of the estate of Joseph Dean, submitted a proposition desiring to sell to the board for park purposes blocks 6 and 7 in Dean's addition for \$16,000 in cash.

Second—That the land proposed to be taken is five or six feet below the street level, and that it would be an expense of at least \$3,000 or \$4,000 to fill the place to grade level.

On motion of Commissioner Bradish this petition was referred to a special committee, and the president and secretary directed to withhold from the certificate of sale until said committee shall have submitted to the board a report thereon.
