EASTMAN-GOODALE.

The Lady Poet-Philanthropist Weds an Indian Physician. New York, June 18.—The marriage of Elaine Goodale, the author, poet, and Indian philanthropist, and Dr. Charles A. Eastman, the Sioux Indian, was solemnized at high noon to-day, at the Church of the Ascension, Tenth street and Broadway, New York. The officiating clergyman was Rev. Dr. E. Winchester McDonald. It was a quiet wedding. Admission to the church was by ticket, and about 200 invited guests witnessed the ceremony. The bride, Elaine Goodale, of West Fifty-seventh street, the daughter of Dr. Eastman, whose paternal grandfather was a white trader at Pine Ridge. He graduated from Dartmouth college, subsequently studied medicine, and is now government medical inspector at Pine Ridge agency. Miss Goodale was born in Berkshire county, Mass., twenty-seven years ago. She is the older of the two child poets of the Berkshire Hills. She began her career as a poet in 1880, and in 1885, at the age of fifteen, she published her first volume, "The Poetess of the Hills." Her work has since been widely read, and she has received many prizes and honors. She is a woman of attractive person and highly cultivated mind. She proposes, however, to resign her position, and her duties compel her to travel extensively, and this she regards as incompatible with her duties as a wife.

OVER A MILLION.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 18.—The French ship Valparaiso arrived here at noon to-day, 22 days from Shields, via the Isthmus. On June 7 her cargo was discovered to be on fire at the main hatch. Two tanks were cut from the deck and water pumped on the burning coal. The crew worked three days to get the fire under control. The Valparaiso met a tug this morning and was towed into port.

Without Fatal Explosion.

CLEVELAND, June 18.—By the explosion of a boiler used to run the drilling machinery at the Akron, O. water-works today Henry Golden was killed, and John Harvey fatally injured, and Clarence Felton, Newton Ramsey, James Martin, James Farabee and Benjamin Hoffman were badly injured. The cause of the explosion is unknown.
