COFFEE KILLS GERMS. The Bacilli of Typhoid Fever

Cholera, Etc., Succumb to Its

Power. ustrated News of the World. Coffee has disinfectant properties. Only recently a Dr. Luderitz has studied in detail the germ-killing action of coffee infusion. Using by no means strong infusions, he showed that a certain harmless microsoccus germ a certain harmless microsoccus germ dies in 10 per cent coffee solution in from three to five days. The bacillus of typhoid fever perished in from one to three days under the coffee influence, and the cholera bacillus in from three to four hours. The germ of anthrax or splenic fever died in from two to three hours; but the spores of young forms of the latter germ perished in from two to four weeks only.

These latter results speak well for the power of coffee as a germicide, for an-


