DRAMATIC POINTS.

Carmenita, the Spanish dancer and the craze of two continents, will this evening make her first appearance before a St. Paul audience, opening a week's engagement at the Metropolitan.

The celebrated Spanish dancer made her first appearance at Koster & Bial's New York city, on the evening of Feb. 10, 1890. She became the craze of the hour, not only among the city people, but among the multitude of ordinary lovers of amusement.
