The Columbian Commission Proposes a Plan to the People

Prorating the Amount Required Among the Several Counties.

Fairs, Concerts and Balls Suggested as Money Making Means.

With a Legislative Reimbursement Where Cash is Advanced.

The gentlemen comprising the Minnesota commission of the Columbian exposition have very wisely decided not to retire under fire.

The fifty-first cent provided for celebrating the fourth-hundred anniversary of the discovery of America by holding an international exhibition.

The favorable responses to this invitation already received, the receipt of a large number of applications for space from this and other countries.

The state of Minnesota, through her representatives in congress and on the Columbian commission, has committed this great undertaking in all its details.

In recognition of this fact her state legislature passed an act, approved August 18th, appropriating the sum of \$500,000, and creating a board of world's fair managers.

The board appointed in virtue of this legislation, the first meeting of the board of managers visited Chicago for the purpose of informing themselves more definitely of the nature of the project.
