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CHIEF-AT-LAW HERDMAN.

Fire Department Investigation May Develop More Than Is Supposed.

Men Connected With the Department Who See No Active Service.

New Light Thrown on the Fight for the Park Board Attorneyship.

The taxpayers of the city of Minneapolis will watch with no little interest the action of the council on the much-talked-of irregularities in the fire department pay rolls.

Ever since the resignation of Chief Stetson there have been many prominent citizens looking their eyes on the workings of the department. The insurance underwriters have been very warm under the collar on more than one occasion and have tried every possible means to find reasons for decapitating the chief officer.

Many of the insurance men are now of an opinion that, if the council thoroughly sifts the pay roll question, enough data will come to the surface to make it especially desirable to a member of the council to be an "old man."

That Aid, Woodard has been the "brains" and had the necessary "influence" during the chief's reign is very well known to those that have had any dealings with the department.

It was Woodard who, in the winter of 1927, and mustered the strength that caused President Potter appointed him chairman of the committee on the fire department.

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THE PAROCHIAL SCHOOLS.

Rev. L. H. Morey, of Stillwater, Discusses Them.

Rev. L. H. Morey, of Stillwater, exchanged pulpits with Rev. D. S. McCarty yesterday, and last evening treated the people of Minneapolis to his views upon the transfer of the Catholic parochial schools, the title of his discourse being "The History of Roman Catholic Opposition to Public Schools."

His discourse was hardly as spirited as was expected, and not by any means as much so as recent sermons on this subject by local ministers.

He called attention to the fact that in the selection of school boards no one was selected because of his religion, and that the teachers could not legally be selected on account of their religion.

Such a course would breed a religious rivalry which would break up the public school system, speaking of religion in the schools, he said:

"In the parochial schools religion is taught, but it is the Catholic religion, and the Catholics, stripped of all disguises, are the only ones who are not taught in the public schools, and they lose their demand for a share of the public funds upon that ground, which is antagonistic to the principles separating church and state."

At last this end has been attained in a very practical way by simply changing the name of the parochial school to a public school and taking down the pictures. However, the most striking of all pictures, the nun's garb, beads and crucifixes are retained.

Either the failure to divide the school fund is unjust or this Stillwater arrangement is just.

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WAS AT GLENDALE.

One of the Robbers Killed in the Lamar, Mo., Fight Was Francis.

A Member of the Quartette Which Robbed Mulrennan at Glendale, Mo.

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 24.—One more of the gang of train robbers which on the night of Nov. 20, at Glendale, Mo., the Adams express messenger, Mulrennan, of all the available variables in his care, is in custody, not of the authorities, but of his Maker.
