SHOT FROM AMBUSH.

Gen. Enriquez and a Party of Friends Murdered in Guatemala.

President Barillas Believed to Have Incited the Foul Killing.

Consul McCreery Involved in Scandalous Deals at His Post of Duty.

French Anarchists Alleged to Have Stolen Dynamite for a Bad Use.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Feb. 23.—A special cablegram from San Salvador, under date of Feb. 23, states that Gen. Enriquez was killed on that day by a body of Guatemalan soldiers, together with a number of companions, near the city of Zacapa, Guatemala, near the Honduran coast.
