Obligations of Members of a Mutual Benefit Society.

Forfeiture of Membership for Non-Payment of Assessment.

Appellate Judges Pass Upon an Important A. O. U. W. Case.

The Lower Courts Upheld in Three Interesting Suits.

The supreme court yesterday sustained the judgment of the lower court in the case of Charles H. Be. edict, an administrator of the estate of Josephine Ror, deceased, appellant, vs. The Grand Lodge, A. O. U. W., respondent.

Provisions of the constitution of the defendant relating to the system of mutual insurance, and providing that notices of assessments for the death of members shall be sent by the secretary of the lodge.

An Error Prevailed. Other decisions filed by the appellate court were:

Edward H. Owens et al., appellants, vs. James G. Freeman et al., defendants. The court affirmed the decision of the lower court in a deed of conveyance of the boundary line of a tract of land.

A Mortgage Defeated. Fennel L. Baker, receiver, et al., respondent, vs. James H. Pott, appellant, et al.

Where mortgaged property remains in the possession of the mortgagor and the mortgage is not filed, it is statute made presumptively fraudulent as to creditors of the mortgagor, a receiver for the benefit of such creditors may dispute the validity of the mortgage without proof of actual fraud.
