**THE SEAL POACHERS.**

Plans Perfected in Expectation of a Good Season.

WASHINGTON, April 2.—The department of the interior has received detailed information from the operations of the sealing vessels now engaged in the seal fishery off Cape Flattery, keeping company with the herd as it moves up the coast on its way to the breeding grounds on the Alaskan coast. On the 21st ult., the American whaler "Meridian" passed them, and reports the water fairly alive with seals, and the vessels had their boats out busily shooting them. Between March 14 and 21 reports from four-seen vessels fix their catch at 2,200 seals.

**SILVER MEN ANGRY.**

Obstruction to Be Resorted to in the House.

WASHINGTON, April 2.—There is reason to believe that the house may yet find itself in a position of embarrassment upon the silver question. One of the strongest advocates of the silver bill said today that the silver men had about decided upon the course that they would pursue. That course is one of obstruction to all legislation (except tariff measures) until their favorite measure is given the right of way. He did not criticize Speaker Crisp for his action, but he said that when the house adjourned on the famous "silver Thursday" it adjourned under a misapprehension. There were eighty men who would not prevent any legislation by the house, he said. Asked as to whether the obstruction would be made to appropriation bills, he said: "It is the appropriation bills. Nothing but tariff until we receive fair consideration for the silver measure."
