HOW BALLOTS TALKED

Milwaukee Maintains Her Position as a Democratic Stronghold.

Mayor Somers and the Entire Ticket In--Council Close.

Ald. Cullerton Beaten, and a Republican Council Possible at Chicago.

Anti-Catholic Sentiment Causes Trouble in Omaha and in Michigan.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., April 5.—Late returns indicate the election of P. J. Somers, Dem., for mayor, over Beecher, Rep., by a majority of from 2,500 to 3,000, together with the whole Democratic ticket.

The general interest displayed today has been unparalleled, and never before has so large a vote been polled.

The odds were decidedly against the Republicans, being conferred by the Democratic majority of 7,100 of last fall's state election, caused by a general bolt of German Lutherans on the parochial school question.

One-third are believed to have returned to their old loyalties.

Sparta, Antigo, Appleton, Chilton, Manitowish, Kewanee, Neshanic, Menasha, Marinette elect pretty much all the Democratic tickets.

Lancaster, Medford and Black River Falls are Republican. Returns are coming in slowly from the larger cities into the contest the gains were about evenly divided between the two.

Chicago's Council Said to Be Republican Now.

CHICAGO, April 5.—The aldermanic and town elections passed off quietly here today, though the vote was the heaviest cast in a municipal election.

At midnight the returns are nearly all showing a shift in the council has changed to Republican in complexion by at least three majority.

Why are the streets not cleaned?

What other city of the size and pretensions of St. Paul would submit for a moment to such a condition of filth and disease-breeding mire?

For years past it has been the boast of the city that it had scrupulously neat and clean thoroughfares, and this fact was the first to impress itself upon the

observation of a stranger. No description of comment of St. Paul was sent abroad for public or private use that did not refer, in terms of highest praise, to the wonderfully clean and well-kept streets of the city.

But how the city has fallen from grace! Its principal thoroughfares are now in a condition of indescribable dirt and filth, and miasms that would be a disgrace to any second-class community in Minnesota.

The condition is so striking a contrast with what the city has been and with what the people have a right to expect that it is all the more conspicuous.

In the open blocks are heaps of rotting refuse and piles of manure, and the streets are completely disappeared from the streets alleys and back lots.

All the dirt, rubbish and garbage that has accumulated through the winter and been hidden under the snow, is now exposed to view and lies rotting in mass on a stretch in the nostrils of the principal streets, is the whole winter's collection of scraps of paper, dirt and horse-offal.

The offense to the eye is the least disagreeable feature. In a few days the spring sun will have effected upon every ferver common to the season, and will be down on all this mass of germinable matter, sending down upon the city enough bacilli and microbes to produce an epidemic.

If the city spring escapes a serious instance of epidemic disease, it will be only by an intervention of Providence.

This is no overdrawn picture. It is a plain, unglorified statement of the actual condition of the streets of St. Paul.

Who is to blame?

If it is the mayor, or the engineer, or the board of public works upon whom the responsibility rests, the full force of public condemnation should fall upon the responsible parties.
