Three Noted Women. The Wednesday afternoon reception last night there were three noted women who have attained prominence in the educational world through sheer force of character and ability. They were the guests of honor, Mrs. Alice Freeman Palmer, of Cambridge, Mass.; Miss Kate B. Hardy and Miss Alice Haire, the last two being at the head of Hardy Hall, Duluth, one of the finest college preparatory schools west of Philadelphia. These estimable ladies already contained a sketch of Mrs. Palmer's career, but very little has ever been said in print of either of the other two, both of whom are remarkable women.

Married for Work. The history of any great enterprise which has been pushed through by the ability of women is almost invariably interesting to women. For many years Miss Hardy and Miss Haire have been warm friends and co-workers; as the former has been the collector of funds for purposes of work several years ago. Believing firmly that the time had come when the North-west could support a preparatory school for the daughters of women offered Duluth a permanent institution of this character if the people could furnish the college buildings, a ready response was made to their proposition, and this year, the fifth for the Hardy school, finds them located in one of the handsomest and most commodious buildings of its kind in this country. Miss Hardy is the business end of the partnership, and Miss Haire, who took the degree at A. B. Smith college, is the "brains."
