

Castor Oil for Warts--Castor oil, it is said, if used in the form of a wash, will remove it without leaving a scar. The time it takes may be longer than that of the wart, but it is worth the wait.

Fruit stains may be removed from the fingers by dipping them in strong tea. Afterwards wash in warm water.

To bleach clothes without injuring the fabric put one pound saltpetre in a new home before you use it. Just as you are about to wash the clothes, add a pint of soap and two table-spoonfuls of the mixture.

To remove a paint spot, saturate the spot on a wood dress with spirits of turpentine, and let it remain several hours when, by rubbing the spot with the hands the paint will crumble away from the fabric.
