Beef Contracts Awarded.

Murphy has been awarded the contract for furnishing beef to Standing Rock agency at \$2.75 to \$3.15 per pound, and for the Fort Belknap agency at \$3.49 per 100 pounds, and for Fort Peck at \$2.84. J. H. Knight has been awarded the contract for beef at Belknap at \$5.41, and W. F. Mellick the Blackfoot contract for \$3.49 per hundred.

SCORES DEAD AND DROWNING.

Tremendous Gas Explosion in a Mine at Roslyn, Wash., Destroys More Than Forty Underground Toilers.

EVERY MAN WAS INSTANTLY KILLED.

The Ill-Fated Pit Is Burning Fiercely, Baffling Rescuers in Their Search for the Multi-lated Victims.

GRIEF AND LAMENTATION AT THE SCENE.

Widows and Orphans Gather in Dozens at the Mouth of the Tomb That Engulfed Their Loved Ones.

WHITES AND BLACKS IN SORROW.

Overflowing Rivers Scattering Ruin and Threatening Far Greater Havoc Unless Rain Ceases.

DARK-COLORED REPORTS FROM ALL SIDES.

SEATTLE, Wash., May 10.—A special to the Post-Intelligencer from Roslyn, Wash., says this afternoon a terrible gas explosion occurred in Mine No. 2 of the Northern Pacific Coal company at that point, in which the loss of life has exceeded that in number of any other disaster that has ever been chronicled in the Northwest. The exact nature of the explosion or circumstances that led to it will probably never be known, since it is believed that every miner who was at work in the slope at the time has perished.

Appalling Execution.

All the bodies so far recovered are terribly burned and mutilated. Those whose bodies were recovered were found near the opening, and at some distance from the point where it is supposed the explosion occurred. Most of the men were 1,500 and 2,000 feet farther in the slope, and in the immediate vicinity of the accident.

MORGANZA LEVÉE SAFE.

NEW ORLEANS, May 10.—There is no truth in the sensational story sent out last night that the Morganza levee had broken. The levee is still withstanding the pressure of the water, and no apprehension is felt for the safety of the millions of dollars' worth of property in the levee above here according to three reports, but tonight came a rumor that the Little Texas in Bayou la Fourche, four miles south of Napoleonville in Assumption parish, had broken. The gap is 140 feet wide and growing. It is flooding a thickly settled and fertile sugar country, and will likely do immense damage.
