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ABOUT RISE RATES.

An Important Hearing Before the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Attempts to Prove Discrimination and the Charging of Unjust Rates.

Now the New Real Estate Board is Ready to Begin Business.

News of the Convention-Politics in Little Pieces.

Yesterday afternoon in the United States court room, Minneapolis, two representatives of the interstate commerce commission began to hear testimony in the case of the Minneapolis chamber of commerce against the railroads of the Northwest, especially those roads that have lines running into both Minneapolis and Duluth. At first it was intended that this hearing should be given by the whole of the commission, but Hon. William L. Morrison, of Illinois, and Hon. J. W. McMillin, of Iowa, were the only two of the commissioners who could come to Minneapolis at this time. So this is but a preliminary hearing of the case. The evidence will be submitted to the two gentlemen, and the case will be argued later on in Washington before the whole commission. The chamber of commerce began the case through Flannery & Cooke, of Minneapolis. They have given the handling of it over to Brown & Brown, of Washington, experienced attorneys in this line of work. The defense is represented by the following array of legal talent:

Attorney Britton opened the case for the complainants. He had a map with the relative distance of wheat centers from Minneapolis and Duluth. In a nutshell, the controversy arises from this: Several of the railroads have lowered their rates on wheat from many points in the Northwest to both Minneapolis and Duluth. The rate on Duluth is lower than that on Minneapolis. This, it is alleged, is discrimination against Minneapolis in favor of a competing point.

The only witness examined yesterday was E. F. Dodge, formerly traffic manager of the Duluth railway. Mr. Dodge has evidently been in the employ of the grain men in the preparation of some of the evidence. But the examination yesterday did not get into the important features of the case. It was mostly devoted to the relative distance of wheat centers from Minneapolis and Duluth. This rate is now 75 cents, and the millers want it reduced to 65 cents.
