CAPT. BORUP DENIES.

French Military Men Terribly Excited by Discovery of a Traitor.

The American Minister's Military Attache Involved in the Scandal.

Bold Allegation That He Assisted a Faithless Clerk in Dirty Work.

Plans of French Defenses Sold to the Italians and Germans.

PARIS, June 25.—A clerk named Greiner, employed in the office of the keeper general of the national archives, has confessed that in return for bribes paid to him by Germany and Italy he has supplied to the armies of those countries plans of the coast defenses of France.

It appears that espionage which the Italian naval authorities have evinced great interest. Germany paid Greiner liberally for the plans of the defenses of Cherbourg, Havre and Brest.

The affair has caused great consternation at headquarters. It is stated that the plans for the last several months have been of little value to the war and admiralty offices at Berlin and Rome.

Suspicion Became Certainty. It is understood that an intercepted letter from Berlin gave the French authorities the proof for which they have arrested and subjected to a severe examination the clerk.

Greiner broke down, and although it is claimed no promise was made to him to induce him to confess, he acknowledged the extent to which he had betrayed the interests of France to Germany and Italy.

France Has No Kick Coming. While the French government is indignant at the course of Germany and Italy in invading the very bureaus of the national administration in order to receive information injurious to their interests, it is not likely that any remonstrance will be presented, as the French themselves have recently been proven, in the case of an Englishman named Greiner, to have paid sums of money for plans of the defenses of Malta, and to have offered more money for copies of Gibraltar. Besides, it is well known that numerous spies in the employment of France frequent the German garrets of the frontier.

Greiner was some time ago suspected of espionage in favor of Germany and Italy. It is said that documents entrusted to him were greatly delayed before they arrived at their destination.

So strong did the suspicions of the officers become that Admiral Gervais ordered that Greiner be closely watched. The detectives who were directed to shadow him ascertained that he frequently visited the house of Capt. Borup, American military attache.

The American in Deep. In the evening he proceeded to Borup's house, where a number of detectives had been stationed with orders to arrest him just as he was entering the building.

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WONDERFUL FEAT.

Chas. H. McGurrin Breaks the World's Record for Writing a Memorized Sentence.

He Attains the Wonderful Speed of Writing 204 Words in One Minute.

Some of His Previous Achievements in the Line of Rapid Typewriting.

C. H. McGurrin again broke the world's record for typewriting a memorized sentence yesterday afternoon in the presence of witnesses at his rooms in the court house building.

Mr. McGurrin made several trials, one of them giving a result of 205 words in one minute, but this was rejected, inasmuch as the work did not exhibit the desired neatness; and the test which was finally accepted, was 204 words, remarkable for its neat appearance, only two slight errors being discovered in the entire 204 words.

This test was given to by the above witnesses before a notary public. The instrument used was the Remington No. 2 typewriter, which Mr. McGurrin has previously used in making his records. The performance of Mr. McGurrin yesterday was remarkable.

An interesting fact in connection with this test is the fact that the record of this year the record was held by F. E. McGurrin, of Salt Lake City, Mr. McGurrin's brother.

Miss Curry, of Syracuse, N. Y., claimed after this test had been made by Mr. McGurrin that she had written 165 words per minute, using the above sentence on a Smith Premier machine.
