

THE TENNIS CRACKS.

Campbell and Huntington Successfully Defend the Title.

Slocum No Longer in Form to Play in the Cham-pion Class.

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 24.--The weather conditions this morning for the second day of the national lawn tennis tournament were as favorable as yesterday and the attendance was large.

Naturally the championship match attracted the greatest interest and diverted attention from several matches in singles which would otherwise have drawn goodly numbers of spectators.

In the doubles the match opened with a decidedly Hall aspect, as that pair quickly took the first three games in succession. Then they lost four straight.

The Wren-Knapp match today was an extraordinary one, and will go down in tennis annals as the most remarkable ever played on any court.

Important matches tomorrow are those between Wren and Budlong, Hovey and Post, Smith and Chase, and Hovey and E. L. Hall. This last is the most important of all and is likely to have more influence on the final outcome of the series.
