DEATH CLAIMED HIM.

Peter Pfeifer, the Capitalist, Suddenly Called Away.

Peter Pfeifer, an old and well known resident of St. Paul, died suddenly at his residence on Summit avenue Saturday evening at 6 o'clock.

Mr. Pfeifer was born in Obermoeren, Kreis Paderborn, in the province of Hesse, Germany, April 4, 1829.

He secured a common school education and at fourteen years of age was apprenticed to the trade of steamfitter and mason.

During the revolution in Germany in 1848 he was a member of the burger guard.

In April, 1850, he entered the German army and served for three years.

On July 22, 1853, he arrived in Philadelphia and worked in the iron and steel industry.

In 1857 he came to St. Paul and established a small vinegar factory and distillery on Norris street.

He was engaged in the hardware business with Philip Metzler and continued in business for several years.

In 1875 he built the Pfeifer block at Eighth and Wabasha streets, and engaged in city contracts.

In 1880 the firm of Pfeifer, Heck, Eiles, wholesale liquor dealers, was organized.

In 1883 Mr. Pfeifer retired from the firm and business.

He was married in Molden, Canada, in June, 1854, and his wife and four children survive him.

VAN SLYKE'S PLANS.

The Assemblyman Proposes a Scheme to Utilize the Market House.

At the last meeting of the assembly Mr. Van Slyke introduced a preamble and resolution touching a possible remodeling of the market house into a building which would contain public baths, a home for the public library and an auditorium.

Mr. Van Slyke's proposal was referred to the committee on public buildings, and from present indications there is little to die.

The impression seems to prevail that the coming legislature will pass an act to enable the city to dispose of the market house property, and if this is done many citizens hope to see it sold for a large sum, that may be utilized to purchase a cheaper piece of property and thereon erect the kind of a building St. Paul is so much in need of.

All this is purely problematical, of course, for even if the legislature does as expected by those who favor selling, the reform administration must be taken into consideration, and it is liable to discourage any enthusiast who will analyze its history thus far.

In the meantime it will be interesting to consider what the adoption of Assemblyman Van Slyke's plan would result in. It would provide for public baths, with a large swimming tank, in the basement. The dimensions would be 75x280 feet, which would give space for all necessary arrangements of partitions, private rooms, and rooms and everything else necessary in a modern, well-equipped public bath house.

Entrances could be provided for on Wabasha, St. Peter and Seventh streets.

On the second floor, a large room or ground floor, three stories would be provided for on the Wabasha street end, which 65x100 feet, which would be very desirable, both in location, and for almost any kind of business.

WILL TAKE \$3,000 OF IT.

Thomson and His Friends Willing to Restore Some Portion.

Ever since the arrest of C. J. Thomson, the defaulting treasurer of the People's Building society, negotiations have been carried on between the prisoner and the community at large to give him the full measure of the punishment due to his crime.

At a meeting of the society held last week the question of accepting at least a portion of the amount of Thomson's payments came up, and it was finally agreed that the society should accept the prisoner's offer to place the figure at \$3,000, that being, according to Mr. Fitzpatrick, the sum which Thomson and his friends could raise.

This was agreed to after a hot debate over the matter, and the society's objection to the part of some of the members. The \$3,000 has been collected, but has not been turned over to the officers of the society yet.

The offense still remains, and no doubt the trial will be held. Thomson has already shown himself decidedly opposed to the settlement of criminal cases by the payment of money to the matter to the fullest extent.
