

EASTERN FORECASTS.

New York Elections Will Be Confined to Electors and Congressmen.

Massachusetts and Rhode Island Will Be Very Close.

New Jersey Will Give Cleveland at Least 5,000 Plurality.

All South Atlantic States Will Land in the Cleveland Column.

New York, Nov. 5.—Besides the presidential electors, members of congress, chief judge of the court of appeals and members of the state assembly are to be elected in this state.

New York City has eight congressional districts. Eighty-five congressmen are to be elected in this state.

Democratic Opposition. The prohibitionists have candidates in all the districts.

There will be no contest for chief justice, because Judge Charles Andrews, the nominee of the legislature, has been informed by the governor.

Next to the election for presidential electors, interest centers in the contest for the assembly.

In New York city the county Democrats made nominations independent of Tammany in most of the assembly districts.

Have Combined on the candidates. The Republicans

have regular nominees in all the other districts. The prohibitionists have candidates in all the districts.

In the Wyoming county district the Democrats have endorsed the nominee of the Farmers Alliance.

In Kings county (the city of Brooklyn) and the other counties throughout the state various county officers are to be elected.

An Important Amendment. The election returns and qualification of any member of either house of the legislature when disputed or contested shall be determined by the courts.

At present disputed electors are to be decided by the legislature. Another provision for the constitution falls of two additional supreme court justices.

The return is to be compared with the vote for president in '88. According to the official legislative manual, Harrison's total vote in the state was 620,328.

Careful Estimates Give Cleveland 6,000 Plurality. TRENTON, N. J., Nov. 5.—New Jersey will vote for president, governor, eight congressmen, eight senators, sixty assemblymen.

There will be no contest for chief justice, because Judge Charles Andrews, the nominee of the legislature, has been informed by the governor.

Next to the election for presidential electors, interest centers in the contest for the assembly.

In New York city the county Democrats made nominations independent of Tammany in most of the assembly districts.

Have Combined on the candidates. The Republicans

on Tuesday choose presidential electors, a governor and other state officers, an executive council of eight members, thirteen members of congress and a legislature.

The result on the presidential ticket is not considered doubtful. The Republicans claim the choice of the Harrison electors by about 20,000 votes.

The Democratic managers, on the other hand, concede that the Republicans will win the election.

Since the election of 1890 the congressional districts of the state have been rearranged by a Republican legislature.

There are now thirteen districts in place of twelve. The Republicans claim that there is no doubt of their success in seven out of thirteen districts.

For the first time in a presidential election votes will be cast this year under the Australian system.

The registration this year is large, in some places favoring one party and in others favoring the other party.

A Republican manager, close to the state committee, has said that Harrison will have 18,000 votes in the state.

The indications are that the Democrats will elect four congressmen and the Republicans three.

The composition of the assembly will be: Democrats, fifty-seven; Republicans, sixty-one.

Massachusetts. Russell Sure and Cleveland Very Probable.

WESTERN FORECASTS

Gen. Stevenson's Nomination Makes Illinois Almost Sure for the Democracy.

Wisconsin Will Also Be Found in the Democratic Column.

Weaver Electors Almost Certain to Come From Nebraska and Kansas.

Chicago, Nov. 5.—The Western state to which all eyes have been turned with greatest interest since the opening of the campaign has been Illinois.

Two years ago the school question and the tariff issue gave the state to the Democrats by pluralities ranging from 12,000 to 20,000.

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MILWAUKEE, Nov. 5.—Chairman Thom of the Republican central committee, claims the state by 20,000 majority.

For the First Time the State Is in the Doubtful Column.

TOPEKA, Nov. 5.—Kansas enjoys the distinction this year, for the first time in its history, of being a doubtful state—at least so far as the national, congressional and legislative concerns are concerned.

Four years ago Kansas gave Harrison a majority of 80,000 votes.

The result of this year, if the Democrats and Populists alike prevail to it, ought to result in the election of Weaver electors.

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The Democrats make few claims. They assert that Morton "has a good chance," and that is all.

IDAHO. Fusionists Will Probably Carry the State.

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 5.—The campaign in Idaho draws to a close with great uncertainty regarding the result.

General Interest in the Campaign at a Low Ebb.

DEER MOINES, Id., Nov. 5.—General interest in Iowa this year has been less than for many years past.

There has been apparent no significant growth of either the People's party or prohibition party in the state.

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
