## BUYING ITS PASSAGE Caprivi Makes a Deal With Centrist to Support the Army Bill.

The Government Will Not Oppose the Jesuits' Return to Germany.

Centrists Will Pass the Later Measure With Help of Other Parties.

Ministerial Circles Continue Confident of the Passage of the Bill.

BERLIN, Nov. 26.—When the debate on the imperial budget opens in the reichstag on Wednesday next some indication will be given as to the manner in which the parties are likely to range themselves on the army bill. The army estimates that were prepared independently of the increased expenditures involved through the new bill amount to 285,000,000 marks, being 12,500,000 marks over the amount contained in the present budget. There is an almost unanimous feeling among the members of the reichstag against proceeding with the army bill until the government's financial proposals connected with the measure are fully disclosed.

The house will compel Chancellor von Caprivi to make an explicit statement during the discussion of the general estimates. Until a full official declaration is made of the government's plans for the new taxation covering the extra expenditures, the leading members of the reichstag are reticent regarding the lines of attack or defense. In the meantime, if the tone of the Centrist and National Liberal orators were an infallible guide, the party has chosen the right moment to bring pressure on the government, which will surrender and will neither oppose nor support the bill, but will let the Centrists pass the measure with the assistance of the Freisinnige party, the Socialists and the Poles, all of whom would vote for the repeal of the present anti-Jesuit law.

The German People, as a people, are indifferent about the results, the presence of a few hundred of whom would not be felt by the country. About forty Centrists who do not support the bill, and the remainder of the party will oppose the bill. The government has also to take into consideration the wrath that will be aroused among the conservatives by the return of the Jesuits and which will counterbalance the other considerations. The ministerial circles are confident that the government will come victoriously out of the crisis.

Among the leading measures that will be submitted to the reichstag is the Immigration bill which was first published last spring as a restrictive measure. This bill, which will aid the efforts of the American government to check undesirable immigration. The emperor's social policy bill, which is called the Heinze law, from the name of the minister who introduced it, will be expedited toward its passage. The emperor is greatly interested in this measure and he wants no delay in its being made a law.

The love-son of the Prussian diet is absent in the discussion of Finance Minister Miquel's fiscal reports. The spectacle of ex-Financier Herr Furth denouncing his former colleagues is almost an unknown event in the history of the laudaz. His speeches have caused several rows. Count Linnbournstorm upbraided Herr Furth for assuming an attitude that was unworthy a statesman who had quitted office. Herr Furth seemed to be stung by this rebuff. He replied that he had been obliged to resign because, while he was minister of the interior, he refused to submit to the demands of the Bavarian party, claiming that their interests were protected at the expense of others.

Minister Miquel's proposals, with some minor amendments, were today referred to a committee. The diet then adjourned sine die. The court and diplomatic circles here are excited over a report that the czar-widow during her recent visit to Vienna paid marked attention to Princess Maria Annunciada, daughter of Archduke Karl Ludwig, brother of Emperor Francis Joseph. Princess Maria will only be seventeen years old on the next anniversary of her birth. She has lived a life of seclusion, having been educated at Castle Reichenau. Her mother, Princess Maria Theresa of Braganza, who is the third wife of the archduke, is a close friend of the czar-widow.

## ROASTS CIVIL SERVICE Gen. Rosecrans Not Impressed With Competitive Examinations of Clerks.

He Strongly Favors Rating by a Monthly Record of Efficiency.

Proposes an Increase of the Salaries Now Paid in His Bureau.

Pension Estimates for 1893 Show Increase of Over \$30,000,000.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—Gen. Rosecrans has submitted his annual report for the operations of the registrar's office of the treasury, over which he presides. He says: "The vastness of the records and constantly increasing number of the government's transactions make it necessary to make a more efficient system of making examinations into them and searching out cases, as a library requires catalogues, and the more recent system of index cards. A beginning of the work has been made, ten expenditures from \$100,000 to \$1,000,000 have been selected, so that any question as to expenditures propounded to the department relating to that period can be promptly answered. It will take a year longer to ascertain the amount of interest the government has paid on its several loans since the foundation of the government."

He Prefers the Monthly Record. On the question of civil service, Gen. Rosecrans strongly favors the system of monthly examinations, as provided by the president's order of Dec. 4, 1891. He said: "Competitive examinations for promotion, as conducted in the two or three head bureaus, have given very unsatisfactory results. The public service does not, as a rule, require the kind of men that the employes should be quick-witted, of average intelligence, able to do a large amount of clerical work, and general matters. It requires efficient clerical service. Therefore the monthly record of efficiency is greatly superior to the haphazard results of the competitive examinations, which require no respect of chiefs or superiors. The monthly record of efficiency only counts for twenty per cent, while the competitive results count 80 per cent, in spite of all their defects. The monthly record of efficiency is a quality of opportunity sometimes occasioned by length of service and of experience. It is a more reliable method and would be vastly better for the service and the country."

Competitive Examinations to reverse the ratios and make the efficiency record count 20 per cent and the results of the examinations 80 per cent. At any rate the proper provision for the exercise of the best judgment of the registrar is to be made here.

Registrar Rosecrans closes by saying: "This is one of the most important duties of the most responsible bureaus in this department, being co-existent with the government itself, but the salaries paid to the registrar, assistant registrar and chief of departments are less than those paid to such officers of other bureaus, as will be seen by the figures here. The registrar's salary is \$4,000, assistant registrar \$2,500; that of chiefs of divisions, \$3,000. It is suggested that the salaries be raised to \$4,500, \$3,000 and \$3,500, respectively. It is also suggested that the salaries of the registrar, assistant registrar and chief of departments be raised to \$5,000, \$3,500 and \$4,000, respectively."

PENSION ESTIMATES. They Are Transmitted to the Secretary of the Treasury.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—The secretary of the interior today transmitted to the secretary of the treasury the estimates required to pay pensions for the fiscal year. The sum of \$106,881,350 will be necessary to pay pensions on account of the army and navy, including the maintenance of pension certificates, clerical and other incidental expenses. Of this amount it is estimated that \$105,000,000 will be paid directly to pensioners, in addition to an estimate of \$146,727,350 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1893, a deficiency of \$105,000,000 is asked. During the first fifteen years of the pension law, the government has expended an estimated \$7,500,000 in round numbers and other incidental expenses.

FOSTER INCREDULOUS. He Doesn't Think Phelps Made London's Army of Outcasts.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—The cable dispatch from Berlin announcing that United States Minister William Walter Phelps had in a general announcement in Germany by making and ill-adviced speech, endorsing the policy and policy of the German government, and by interposing a policy of the government of the German emperor, to which he is accredited, was received at the state department with a much surprised and incredulous expression. Secretary of State Foster openly expressed incredulity as to the truth of the report. He did not believe that Mr. Phelps, who prior to his appointment to Germany, had served with credit as minister to Austria—one of the most difficult diplomatic positions in Europe—had suddenly lost his discretion and good judgment. On the contrary, he preferred to believe that the first reports received of Mr. Phelps' speech, which were in every way defensible diplomatically and otherwise, were correct, and that the later report was an afterthought of somebody based upon misinformation as to what he really said.

Appointed a New Commissioner. WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—The secretary of the interior has appointed the following named as commission to reopen negotiations with the Shoshone and Arapahoe Indians in Wyoming the territory of the United States of certain portions of their reservation and to negotiate with the Flathead and Confederated tribes of Indians in Montana. The commission consists of Cheyenne, Wyo., and Napoleon B. Crump, Harrison, Ark.

A CORN HUSKING. Husking for Red Ears and Dancing in the Cornfield.

New York Sun.
