

NOW CURLING BOOMS.

Great Preparations Going Forward for the Big January Bouspiel.

List of the Splendid Prizes to Be Awarded the Sturdy Winners.

Rinks to Come From Manitoba and Many Northwestern States.

The Event of the Winter in Sporting Circles in This Section.

The St. Paul Curling club is very busy getting up its programme for the coming bouspiel, which commences Jan. 17. The club is confident of presenting a curling bill of fare which will suit the most fastidious. The events, as outlined, will consist of the following matches for all comers: First, the Jobbers' Union trophy, a solid silver tankard, valued at \$300. With this will go four individual prizes to the winners of the property of the winning rink. Second, the St. Paul trophy, presented by the citizens of St. Paul, valued at \$200, with four individual prizes. This prize will become the property of the winning rink. Third, the George Hall Diamond trophy, valued at \$175, with four prizes to the winning rink. This prize will become the property of the skip winning it three times. Fourth, the Gov. Merrim Diamond medal, valued at \$150, open to two rinks only from each club. Fifth, the Consolation trophy, consisting of four pairs of red home curling stones, even as the rink defeated in the first draw of the first three events. Sixth, the Point Contest for four handsome medals. In addition to the above medals, the curling association to the Northwestern Curling association may compete for the John Johnston trophy, a magnificent solid silver tankard, valued at \$100, presented by the president of the association, the Hon. John Johnston, of Milwaukee. This trophy becomes the property of the rink winning it three times and with it go four individual prizes. The Gordon medal, a one-rink match, will also be open to members of the association. In addition to the above, a friend to all curlers, residing at Milwaukee, offers a very handsome medal to be competed for by any rink from any club, all the members of which must be of the age of fifty years. This will be called the veterans' match, and is open to the world. The noble game is booming everywhere this year, Chicago occupies the leading position in the curling park for a rink. Milwaukee has two rinks, one erected at a cost of over \$100. Minneapolis is curling in the exhibition building, the largest and finest curling rink in the world. Fargo is building a new rink, and Duluth has a \$100,000 rink well under way. St. Paul has held two bouspiels in the past year, both great successes. That the city at large profits by these meetings of curlers we are permitted to copy the following letter: Brandon, Minn., Dec. 12, 1920.—Hon. Willam Rodgers—Dear Sir: As the curling season is now in full swing, I thought I would like to hear from you. I hope to have you and me partners of your bouspiel, as two or three rinks intend to go from here. As a result of my going to the St. Paul bouspiel last year I have bought over \$200 worth of St. Paul manufactured goods. I should be a strong inducement in favor of your annual bouspiel, and I suppose lots of others have bought more than I have. I see you and have the pleasure of knocking you out at the bouspiel. The curling club has assurances that at least ten cities in Minnesota will send from one to four rinks each to the coming bouspiel, and the club is preparing to give all a royal welcome. Some of the rinks will journey over a thousand miles to reach St. Paul. The Northwestern association will be here in force, and the battle will be fierce between Canada and the United States for curling honors. Tomorrow night three rinks from St. Paul will assist Minneapolis in opening her new rink.

READY FOR DISTRIBUTION. Chilean Cash Now in Uncle Sam's Hands. WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—The \$75,000 paid by the Chilean government in full for all claims arising out of the Baltimore affair at Valparaiso was covered into the sub-treasury at New York today. The draft for that sum was brought to this country by Minister Egan in October last. The necessary preliminary having been performed, the money now being in the actual possession of the government, arrangements will be made as soon as possible for its equitable distribution to the people for whom it is intended. This important branch of the transaction is in the hands of the secretary of the treasury, and it is expected that the matter will be closed up satisfactorily during the present administration.

STILL WATER NEWS. A meeting of the stockholders and officers of the Mineral Point Mining company was held yesterday afternoon in the office of Nelson & Johnson for the purpose of making several important changes. The property, which consists of a fairly rich mine and an abundance of timber, is situated near Mineral Point.

Spread Before the Joint Committee on Immigration. WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—Some very interesting and valuable information relative to the laboring classes of Europe was submitted to the joint committee on immigration, which this morning met to confer about the bill introduced by Mr. Chandler in the senate, to suspend immigration for one year. Graphic pictures of European life among the laboring classes and the conditions drawn by Walter L. Griffin, commercial agent of the United States at Limoges, France. After hearing Mr. Griffin an agreement was reached that the joint committee on legislation, to consist of six members—three from the senate and three from the house—should be appointed by the chairman of the committee to consider any special measure now before the committee proposing to suspend immigration, and to perfect some measure for this purpose by Thursday, on which day they are to report to the full joint committee.

INTERSTATE AMENDMENTS. Senator Cullom Introduces Two in the Senate. WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—Senator Cullom today introduced in the senate two bills that are intended to strengthen weak points in the interstate commerce act. The first compels the testimony of witnesses before the interstate commerce commission. The other bill defines the word "line" as used in the interstate commerce law, and construes it to mean a physical line, whether one railroad or two or more connecting railroads, or part railroad and part water, when both are used on common control. The words "any common carrier" are construed to mean one or more than one such carrier, and each common carrier to be individually responsible for rates over such lines in which it is interested.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—The members of the house from the districts bordering on the great lakes, and to a minor degree, members from the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, are awaiting with a great deal of interest the action of the house tomorrow when the omnibus lighthouse bill is called up. The commerce committee has the day tomorrow for its bill, and has put the lighthouse bill at the head of the list. It appropriates in the neighborhood of a half-million dollars for lighthouses and lights on the great lakes.

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To Investigate Raft Towing. WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—Raft towing on the great lakes and their connecting waters is to be the subject of an investigation under a resolution introduced today in the senate by Mr. McMillan. The resolution authorizes the secretary of war to appoint a board of three officers of the engineer corps of the army to look into this subject and report to congress what restrictions, if any, should be placed upon the size and number of constructing and towing rafts upon the waters mentioned.

Revising the Agreement. CHICAGO, Dec. 20.—The committee appointed to revise the agreement of the Western Passenger association held its first meeting today.
