LEO IS GRATIFIED

With the Results Accomplished by Mr. Satali in the United States.

Further Instructions Sent to Him From Rome in Regard to His Mission.

Rome, Dec. 20.—Mr. Satali has sent to Cardinal Rampolla an important letter containing the two decisions and report of the proceedings of the American bishops' conference, and Rampolla has replied without delay, expressing the pope's satisfaction with the communication, and giving further instructions regarding Satali's mission to the United States.

A high church authority says that the Vatican is in fact well pleased with the decisions of the conference on the schismatic question, considering them at once moderate and tending to union and peace. This satisfaction is all the more lively, seeing that the resolutions are in harmony with precise instructions given by the pope to Mr. Satali. The pope would have opposed absolutely any proposals tending to hamper his policy of pacification, or encourage discussion between American sentiment and the episcopate between religion and the state. This high authority adds:

"I read in the American papers a statement that Mr. Satali has received from Rome the power to decide without appeal questions pending between the bishops and the priests. This secret has been open since the beginning of the year, and I am able to add, without indiscretion, that Satali before leaving Rome was furnished with this power and invested with other powers, which are necessary for the development of the church, and to the peace and prosperity of the young American democracy. The American church now presents the broad signification of the papal pronouncement by the congregation of the prophecies, and a complete charter. Mr. Ireland has begun what Rome has continued, and the episcopate has crowned. The holy see approves entirely the proceedings of the American bishops who seek to draw closer church and state, the republic and religion, and to secure national unification and the tranquil co-operation of all the constituted powers."

Although the date of the consistency is not yet fixed, it is probable that it will take place soon, as the pope has just sent the official announcement of their intended elevation, the cardinalate to various archbishops.

REPUBLICANS DEFEATED.

Failure of Their Scheme to Capture the Nebraska Legislature. LINCOLN, Neb., Dec. 20.—The state supreme court this afternoon refused to issue the writ asked for in the Clay county contest cases, thus throwing the matter out of the courts. The cases were brought by the Republicans, who tried to secure a writ to compel the clerk of Clay county to issue certificates to the three Republican candidates for the legislature instead of the Democratic candidates, who were elected on the face of the returns. The basis for the appeal to the courts was the fact that the names of the Independent candidates were printed twice on the tickets. The Republican chance of capturing the legislature have been shattered by this decision.

San Francisco a Professor.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 20.—The Examiner this morning says that President Harrison has accepted a proposition from President Jordan, of the S. Leland Stanford Jr. university to become a member of the faculty of that institution. His duties will comprise a series of law lectures, which will call him to Palo Alto two or three times a year, and his probable term will make California his winter residence.

It Has No Demands to Make of President-Elect Cleveland.

His Administration Will Receive the Society's Hearty Support.

Any Appointment He Makes Will Be Satisfactory to It.

Kansas Populists Will Enjoy Contesting Republican Legislators.

New York, Dec. 20.—The Herald said today: "Tammany hall, through Richard Croker, its official chief, declares that it has no demands to make of President-elect Cleveland, nor any suggestions to offer regarding appointments. Many rumors about Tammany's attitude caused Mr. Croker to make the following statement: 'Mr. Cleveland, during his administration, will receive the hearty support of the Democrats in Tammany hall. Any appointment he makes will be satisfactory to this organization. Tammany hall loyally supported Mr. Cleveland for the presidency, and it will support him just as loyally in his administration. We will do all in our power to relieve him from any embarrassment in the matter of appointing. We have no requests to make.'"

"A few minutes later Mr. Croker said: 'It is absurd to talk about any Democrat or Democrat endeavoring to embarrass Mr. Cleveland in his administration. Such a course would ruin any one politically who saw fit to attempt it.'"

BY INJUNCTIONS.

How the Populists Will Head Off the Republicans in Kansas.

TOPEKA, Kan., Dec. 20.—Proceedings will be instituted before the supreme court by the Populist central committee enjoining ten Republicans who have been appointed by the state board of canvassers to be compelled to resign their seats in the lower house of the legislature. Attorneys who were given charge of the contested cases have decided to make two attempts at securing the house, one before the supreme court, and the second before the legislative body itself. After the cases are in court preliminary proceedings will be instituted demanding that the state board of canvassers be compelled to annul certificates already issued to Republicans whose seats are contested. If this scheme is successful it will give the Populists enough votes to organize the lower house. Attorneys here say that the supreme court has no jurisdiction over legislative bodies, and that all contests must be decided by these bodies for themselves. At a meeting of the Populist editors of the state held here today a resolution declaring that only a regular Populist elected senator was voted down. It was claimed that John C. Breidenbach, chairman of the Populist central committee, who caused the suits to be instituted, was organizing the Populist legislators to take a stand for the election of one of their own number instead of a fusion Democrat. A loan has been started for Breidenbach for senator, and he admitted in an interview tonight that he would accept the place.
