ITS EMPTY PULPIT. The Leading Feature of the House of Hope Church Meeting.

The House of Hope church held its annual meeting in the church parlors last night. There was a good attendance, but not so large as a church with such a membership had reason to expect.

The meeting was opened by prayer and music. The chairman of the board of trustees, Knox Taylor, then made a financial statement showing that the church had received during the last year \$10,000 from various sources and from new pews \$10,000, making a total of \$20,000.

The election of trustees being next in order those who hold the positions were re-elected, being C. E. Noyes, L. C. Field and Emerson Huxley.

The election of trustees was followed by music. The clerk of session, Thomas Cochran, reported the names of the members in the church Jan. 1, 1905. The report of the devotional committee showed the vacancy of the pulpit and spoke of that for twelve days it had been supplied by others than the pastor.

It also reported the resignation of the assistant pastor, W. D. Laid, to enter as a student of law at Westminster academy at Chicago, and the engagement of Rev. Donald Grant to fill the position of assistant pastor. The resignation of Dr. Laid had added much to the difficulty of the work of the church, but showed also the affection and zeal of the members who had formed in Dr. Laid's person a model of a minister.

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
