GREAT FALLS, Mont., Feb. 16.—The chinook wind which ceased this evening has been blowing briskly over this section of Montana for fifty hours, and the snow is about as usual. As reports come in from the distant ranges, it is apparent that the loss of cattle has been largely exaggerated in many instances, though Texans and cows have suffered severely. On the other hand, the loss of sheep is larger than was at first supposed. Some stockmen think that the value of the sheep sacrificed through Northern blizzards will equal the loss by cattle.

Run Insane to Death. Special to the Globe. WINONA, Minn., Feb. 16.—Frank Sarazin, tower watchman for the Milwaukee road here, went insane while at his post of duty late last night. While in the tower he stripped himself stark naked and ran yelling down the railroad track toward the freight yards. A locomotive being taken into the round house for the night struck Sarazin at full speed, inflicting injuries of which he died this afternoon. South Dakota Snarl. Between the Governor and the House of Representatives. Special to the Globe. Pierre, S. The house passed a bill making county or municipal insurance companies organized in this state to have a paid-up capital of \$100,000, and requiring \$100,000 of this to be deposited in the state treasury.
