NO SPECIAL PRIVILEGE.

Minnesota Constitution Contains the Same Provision.

That the scalpers law does not seriously scare the local ticket brokers is more apparent since the decision of the Illinois law declaring that indictments brought under the law would not stand. The court there decided that it would be a very unusual delegation of the power of the state to give to persons or corporations the right to license sellers of tickets, or to give them the right to prevent other persons or corporations from giving others the right to sell tickets. The court there went further and showed that the law was unconstitutional in that state. The constitution of the state of Minnesota is identical with a similar provision of the Illinois constitution with the exception that the words "except municipal" occurs in the Minnesota provision. Article 3, section 33, of the Minnesota constitution recites that "The legislature is prohibited from enacting any special law in the following cases." Clause 10 of this section reads: "For granting to any individual, association or corporation, except municipal, any special or exclusive privilege, immunity or franchise whatever." This is the point on which the Illinois court knocked out the law there. A similar knock-out will follow here.

THE WEST IS ALERT

And Wide Awake to the Immense Possibilities of Reciprocity.

Prospects Are Flattering for the Success of the June Convention.

Sentiment of the Northwest Is Fast Crystallizing Into Shape.

Information From Widely Diverse Sections Shows the Drift of Opinion.

The prospects, general and particular, for the Canadian United States reciprocity convention, that is to be held in this city on the 5th of June, is most promising of salutary results. The entire Northwest is certainly aroused, and the Democratic principles that were so effectively enunciated in the last campaign have proven gratifyingly fruitful. It is a long step toward the ultimate abolition of the high tariff extortion that has held the country in bands of steel under Republican domination. The relations in world affairs, in line. board of trade of the spirit and of the proceedings of that gathering. Although at a greater distance from the Canadian line than some of the commercial ports of us, I presume more of our citizens, in proportion to our population, have an interest in the question which will be considered by such a convention than in any other municipality in our state.

"Quite a large amount of manufactured goods from this city passes over into Canada and is sold there. Again, many of our grain men are practically interested in this question of reciprocity. Mr. O'Neill, of this city, who handles almost the entire barley production of this country west of the Mississippi river, was one of our delegates to the Grand Forks convention and is greatly interested in all these questions of reciprocal trade with Canada.

Minnesota Vially Interested.

"Now I mention all this to show our interest in these questions and in the coming convention, and to ask if there is anything that we can do here to aid in making it a success, and in manifesting the vast interests of the Northwest in these important questions. At present our state is more vially interested than any other in the boundary between Minnesota and the British possessions north of us, now rapidly developing, is a mere artificial line, over which the citizens of each nation pass and repass without scarcely noticing where the one begins and the other ends. In the states east of us bordering on the Dominion there are natural marked boundaries, that to some extent diminish the facilities of international commerce.

"I write you this to know whether we can do anything to aid in the coming convention. Of course we shall send delegates, but if anything else is needed please let me know."

As was stated in a GLOBE reporter by Mr. McMillin yesterday, at the time of the Grand Forks convention, that so much has been said and written about the question of reciprocity was not only very problematical, but entirely experimental in its scientific elements. It turned out to be a matter of fact, and the state of Minnesota and her patriotic and progressive citizens conceived it. To be specific, it was experimental in the sense that no one really had an adequate or reliable conception of just how much interest the citizens of both nations would manifest. The phase of experiment has been passed. It is no longer a matter of doubt in the minds of those who have been most actively engaged in the work of bringing about the desired relief for the people of both countries.

Since that memorable convention, letters have been received from prominent citizens all over the Northwest, including especially Montana and Washington, expressing a hearty and enthusiastic sympathy with the movement. The press of all the leading cities from St. Paul to the Pacific coast team with like sentiments. Moreover, letters of regret have been received from all sections of the territory indicated because citizens of invitation were not received by them to attend the Grand Forks convention. This places more emphasis on the importance of the project that is now in hand.

The West Aroused.

E. V. Snelley, who has recently been spending a vacation in the West, states that he has often been approached on the subject. He says that the most enterprising citizens seem thoroughly alive to the importance of abolishing the high protective tariff that now hampers commercial relations between these two nations that are only separated by an imaginary line. It may be of interest to the material welfare of both countries, and they are not slow to express their opinions. It is a live question there today, and it will be until the desired relief shall have been secured.

Prominent people connected with the commercial bodies of Seattle and Tacoma, and also of Victoria, Vancouver and New Westminster on the Canadian side of the line, have declared their intention to attend the St. Paul convention, and to lift their voices in protest against a perpetuation of the present extortionate tribute to the monopolists who profit by the protective tariff rates that block international commerce. So the associated committees of the various bodies of St. Paul that have been entrusted with the responsible work of bringing about the reciprocity convention feel confident that it will not only be largely attended, but that it will result in so stimulating the incipient sentiment that the proposed treaty will become a fact at as early a day as possible.

John Keen, of Spokane, who is the president of the Gold Nugget Mining company, was recently in this city, and he unqualifiedly said that the people of Spokane are thoroughly aroused to the importance of the movement, and that a big delegation from there will certainly be here. They are especially earnest, for the reason that they have a large smelter that is now idle because of the tariff. To explain, the United States wages a heavy tax upon the rich silver-lead ores of the Kootenai country, and the Dominion tariff is also so high that it prevents the use as a flux to mix with the more refractory ores of the United States side of the boundary line, the matte ore of the Canadian mines. The refractory ore needs this soft ore to make the smelting process profitable. Therefore there is no danger that Spokane will not heartily enter into the spirit of the occasion and send a delegation to the coming convention.

And Try and Stop Posting 8 bow Bills in Windows.

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
