CREATED IN A FLAT.

Five Persons Burned to Death in a Fire in a Gotham Apartment House.

New York, June 3.—Four persons were burned to death at a fire at midnight in the five-story flat at 138 East Forty-third street. They were William Bente, twenty-three years old; Louise Bente, his wife; Bessie Bente, twenty-five years old; Helen Wetmore Bente, five, his sister; Helen Wetmore Bente, five, his niece. The Bente family occupied the top flat. The fire started on the third floor, which was vacant, and ran up the air shaft. Every one in the house was in bed. The fire covered. Later another body was found in the same flat. It was identified as a man named Paguesky, who was a boarder with the Bentes. This makes five deaths. There were many narrow escapes of other tenants.

Furniture Dealers Attached.

PHILADELPHIA, June 3.—Executions were issued this afternoon from common pleas court judgments entered against Clark, Thomas & Co., furniture dealers, on judgment notes aggregating upwards of \$100,000. Five executions were issued from the same tribunal against Philip C. Shaffer, a furniture dealer, on judgments aggregating \$25,000. Shaffer indorsed paper for Clark, Thomas & Co. to the amount of \$22,000, and his failure was precipitated by the above firm's embarrassment.
