


EVERY DAY A STAR!

Monday Is Opening Day, With a Grand Three-Race Programme.

Tuesday, the Glorious Fourth, is Derby Day, with the Grandest Trotting Event of the year, the Three-Mile Trotting Derby for a \$3,000 Purse.
 Wednesday is another grand day. Three big events, with nearly 100 starters.
 Thursday the 2:30 stake will be the attraction. The biggest field of high-class performers ever started for that division in this state.
 Friday, the last day, has a big programme, with nearly 75 horses to perform.



Over two hundred of the highest class trotters and pacers ever quartered on any Western track can now be found on the grounds of the Minneapolis Driving Club. Never has there been the enthusiasm over a trotting meeting in the West as over that of the big racing carnival that opens on Monday, July 3, and continues for five days. What day is the best? is asked by every one. "Every day," is the answer. Monday the 2:50 trot, with a mammoth field of first-class performers, and the 2:20 pace, with 10 seasoned campaigners of that division from all over the country. The final race of the day is the 2:14 class trot, and in it is the champion trotting stallion Mark Sirius, 2:14; the queen of trotting mares of the West Kentucky Union, 2:13 as a three-year-old. The favorite Minnesota mare Clara P, 2:17; the grand old trotter Thornless, 2:15, and the speedy trotter from Missouri, Grace Napoleon, 2:14.

The Glorious Fourth brings out the Great Trotting Derby, in which the nominations number twenty-five of the best known long-distance trotters of the 2:35 division of the world. Nearly every state in the Union is represented in this race, and even Canada has furnished us with a nomination of a first-class three-miler. Examine the grand list of entries given in this issue.

Deluged With Burning Gasoline.
 HAMILTON, O., July 1.—Yesterday afternoon, just previous to a balloon ascension at Londonwald park, a bucket of gasoline exploded, throwing the burning oil on a score of spectators. Willie Keys, eight years old, was so badly burned that he will die, and the six-year old son of George Campton was also badly burned. In several instances the clothes of the unfortunate victims were literally burned from their bodies.

He went in bathing and got under the boat, and but for the assistance of the students would have drowned. The boat passed through here at 11:45. A large crowd met the boat, guns were fired, whistles blew and bells rung.

Lowered the Reservoir.
 EAST LIVERPOOL, O., July 1.—After several hours of apprehension, during which the residents in the line of the threatening deluge had mostly removed from their houses, the water in the lower reservoir, which threatened to collapse and pour a flood of water down a declivity of 350 feet to the river, was safely lowered until the danger point was passed.
