He Thinks India Will Soon Be Buying Silver. WASHINGTON, July 6.—"What of the night?" said a reporter to Gen. A. J. Warner, president of the American Bimetallic league, Gen. Warner said: "I see that the legislative council of India has decided to receive sovereigns at the treasury of India and to issue a new currency in rupees, but not Bank of England notes, nor will they pay out gold for rupees. The council has also carefully abstained from any mention of the fact that they should do so Europe would rapidly be drained of its gold to settle balances with India. The policy, therefore, is simply to sell coupon bills which are drafts on the Indian treasury for rupees, for gold, and then to buy silver on settlement account at the rate fixed in the Indian treasury. We may look for a government at any time. In fact that government has already issued a sort of Bland law, excepting that it has fixed the ratio at 21 1/2 for converting rupees into dollars and cents. The West will continue for any length of time silver will rise, as the result of a government of the kind which is being formed by our government and on account of India."

San Francisco Chosen as the Place of Meeting in 1894. MONTEALE, July 6.—The Christian Endeavor convention got down to business today. The delegates were welcomed to the city by representatives of Montreal's religious life. At 6:30 there had been prayer meetings in half a dozen churches in the largest city, but it was not until 10 o'clock, when the first meeting was held in the drill hall, that Montreal had an opportunity of fully appreciating the great multitude that had entered the city's gates within the past twenty-four hours. The drill hall is a vast structure—a real-estate masterpiece with ease on its spacious floor—but it was filled to overflowing with delegates to the twelfth annual convention. On the platform were representative clergymen of all the leading cities of the continent. For half an hour the vast multitude sang gospel hymns with dash and vigor, and then Rev. Dr. Clarke rose and led the audience in repeating the Twenty-third Psalm, after which Rev. G. B. Keeche of the Protestant mission, J. A. McNeill of the Roman Catholic church, and another hymn; in fact, there was a hymn sandwiched in between each number of the program. Then Rev. J. A. McNeill welcomed the convention.

Welcomed the Convention on behalf of the pastors of Montreal. His address was short. After him came Senator Desjardins, the mayor of Montreal, wearing his chain of office. He got a royal welcome from the convention and when, after prefaceing his remarks by a few words of welcome, he said: "While I am a Roman Catholic myself, and while Montreal is a Roman Catholic city, that is, the greater portion of her citizens profess that faith, none will extend a heartier welcome than we will."
