

JAY LA DUE'S TRIUMPH.

THE MINNESOTA COMMISSIONERS GAINS A BIG POINT

BY CHANGING DATES AT FAIR.

Blinded Horses of All Classes Being Entered by the Foremost Breeders—No Attempt to Intention to Shut Any One Out—Minnesota Will Have Proud Representation.

Hon. Jay La Due, vice president of the world's fair commission for the state of Minnesota, and senator from Rock county in the legislature the past two sessions, is an enthusiastic horse man, as well as breeder. To him is due the credit of securing the extension of time for the showing of thoroughbred horses and trotting strains at the world's fair from the 21st of August to the 10th of October. Otherwise the exhibition must have been an abject failure. At this time all the best animals are entered in the races throughout the country, and the Minnesota horses are to participate in the circuit that will soon begin. The owners could not afford to forego their entries in the race meets for the benefit of the fair.

Senator La Due realized this fact when he first undertook the duties devolving upon him as a world's fair commissioner in this respect, and for three months he has diligently labored for this extension of time. He has just succeeded, and he is entitled to the thanks of the breeders of the West, and they are not slow in manifesting their appreciation.

Senator La Due was a guest of the Merchants' yesterday, and last evening left the city for Northfield, where he has arranged for a meeting of the leading horse breeders of that section, with a view to securing their entries for the horse show in Chicago.

Large List of Entries. "I feel gratified with the success of my mission about the state," said he to a Globe reporter yesterday afternoon. "I have been traveling for several days visiting the leading breeders of the state, and have secured a large list of entries, and an confident that it will be greatly increased within the coming week. It is not too much to expect, in my judgment, that we will have at least seventy head of horses and 100 head of cattle to represent the industry in Minnesota, and I want to add that I really believe that we will stand second to the state of Illinois, and that we will carry off full share of the blue ribbons. I have secured the entries of N. P. Clark, of St. Cloud; of Willard & Fuller, of Fourth Street; of W. P. Baldwin, of Plainview; of R. E. LeRoi, of Newburgh; and an certain of the other leading breeders of the state."

"Among the cattle that have already been entered," pursued the senator, "are the fourteen Devons owned and bred by E. Hoppin, of Dexter, and others as follows: A. P. Foster, Plainville, fourteen Jerseys; C. N. Cosgrove, Le Sueur, sixteen Herefords; W. H. Brown, Minneapolis, twenty-four short horns; F. A. Squiers, of Blue Earth, fourteen Swis; Hugh Paell, of Dundee, sixteen Galloways."

BARBERS' APPEAL. Cheap Shops Held to Be Dangerous to Public Welfare. The Barbers' union held a lengthy meeting last night at Labor hall. It was decided to issue a general circular appealing to the people to patronize union shops and give them such support as will enable them to exist and pay fair wages to employees. The circular calls attention to the fact that shops that cut hair for ten cents cannot do good work, and, besides that, cannot be cleanly. Such conditions are liable to disseminate disease, because the use of razors and keeping of razors, lather and other things about the shop clean and in good condition will be out of the question, and will eventually do great injury and give the patronous of the cheap and uncleanly shops.

The union elected Louis Weihe as marshal for Labor day. James Clary and Fred Penfield were named as a committee on uniform and badges. M. E. Murray, Charles Carlin and Louis Weihe were named as a committee to interview the bosses and ask them to close their shops during the parade on Labor day.

VANDERBOEF IS CONTRITE. The Pilfering Postoffice Clerk Will Make Restitution. Harry Vanderboef, mentioned in the Globe of Sunday, having been arrested for pilfering registered letters when clerk in the Brown's Valley postoffice, had a hearing before United States Commissioner William A. Spencer yesterday, and was committed to the jail here in default of \$1,500 bail for his appearance when the federal grand jury convenes at the October term of the United States circuit court, which meets in Duluth. Postoffice Inspector Gould worked up the case. Vanderboef, the fish dealer, was arrested in New York, and who is a young man of good appearance and address, laments his unfortunate situation sincerely. He admitted that he began peculations in June of last year and kept them up until last December, rifling nearly every registered letter that went through the postoffice at Brown's Valley.
