WAS IT AN ACCIDENT?

He Goes to Bed at 2 O'Clock in the Morning—Three Hours Later His Body is Found on the Sidewalk in Front of the Hotel—He Dies at the City Hospital.

At 2 o'clock yesterday morning two men entered the Hotel Grace, on Washington avenue south, between Fourth and Fifth avenues, and asked for a room.

Three hours later a passer-by on Washington avenue saw a man stretched out on the sidewalk in front of the Hotel Grace, dressed in nothing but his undershirt and drawers.

One side of his head was crushed, his jaw broken and one leg and an arm fractured. He was taken to the city hospital, where he died about 6:30 a. m.

The hotel people think that it was an accident, as the window sill is very low and that any one ignorant of that fact might easily fall out, especially if he had not perfect control over his movements.
