

RIOT OF THE UNEMPLOYED. THE GERMAN AFFAIR CAUSED BY POLICE BRUTALITY. REICHTAG TO INVESTIGATE.

Socialists Denounce the Unprovoked Ferocity of the Police and the Manner in Which They Chased and Clubbed People—Anarchists Say the Affair Will Bring Them Results.

According to the law, people intending to hold a public meeting must notify the police of such intention at least twenty-four hours previous to the time fixed upon for the assembly of the persons called together. If this is carried out and the police refuse to allow the meeting to be held, the organizer of the meeting receives a written acknowledgment of this fact from the police. This acknowledgment or receipt must be shown to the police officer detailed to watch the meeting, otherwise the meeting is not allowed to be held.

On the other hand, the socialists and others contend that the arrest of Rodrian was a deliberate plot, planned in order to prevent the meeting, which it is claimed, was to be held in the hall of the unemployed workers on Monday night, and was taken to the police depot before he could communicate with his friends. As a result, the receipt could not be presented to the police officer detailed to watch the meeting at the meeting place, and the meeting was held in the hall of the unemployed workers.

When the officers ordered a general attack on the police, mounted on foot, especially the former, immediately set into the multitude, slashing right and left with the flat of their sabers, while the detectives, who were also present in strong force, used their rubber clubs vigorously.

The crowd, though naturally angered by this apparently unjustified attack, made no organized resistance, but simply fled from the scene of the disturbance as fast as possible, and were followed by the police, who seemed to have furiously clubbed the innocent spectators of the neighborhood as well as the striking workmen with equal ferocity. This clubbing and pursuit of the people in the vicinity appears to have been kept up for an unreasonable time, the police actually pursuing people into their houses and beating them, apparently unprovoked, by their officers for at least half an hour, during which time the people of the neighborhood hastily closed and barricaded their shops and houses, and sought refuge in the cellars from the ferocity of the police.

The socialist labor organs have not been slow to take advantage of this brutality upon the part of the police, and are now publishing a considerable amount of material on it. The organs referred to loudly demand a most strict inquiry into the so-called "police savagery" and the manner in which the police acted on the occasion. It is announced today that the socialist deputies introduced a resolution in the reichstag regarding the distress of the unemployed, and intend to bring about a full discussion of the conduct of the police at the recent public meetings, during which, it is said, facts will be presented which will tend to show that the police have been engaged in a systematic effort to cause disturbance among the workmen in order that they might have the opportunity of "teaching them a lesson."

STILLWATER NEWS. Events of Saturday in the City on the St. Croix. Secretary Hart, of the state board of corrections and charities, was in the city yesterday, and spent a few moments looking over the city jail. He found it in good condition, and paid the compliment by saying that the jail is one of the best in the state. Terrible Snow Storm. SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 20.—The worst snow storm for twenty years is reported from points in the northern part of the state. At Redding the snow is drifting badly, causing a number of accidents. The river is rising rapidly and the low-lying country is threatened with inundation. At Siskiyou, the official snowfall for the last twenty-four hours is forty-eight inches. All north-bound trains are blocked. A furious snow storm is raging in the mountains northwest of Sacramento, on the line of the Southern Pacific road. All the snow plows are at work in the mountains, and the available men are at work shoveling snow. Thus far all trains have been kept moving.
