A PERFECT GOLD MINE.

PROF. POWELL ON THE VALUE OF THE BOVINE. AN INTERESTING SESSION.

Of the State Farmers' Institute—The Dairy Products of Minnesota—Prof. Shaw Makes an Instructive Address on the Subject of Farm Stock—Addresses by Supt. Gregg and Others.

The second day's session of the farmers' institute at Century hall yesterday showed an increased attendance, and great interest was taken in the proceedings.

The institute resumed business yesterday morning at 10 o'clock in two distinct sections. One section listened to Hon. George Jones, The other to an address by Prof. Powell on the value of the bovine.

Prof. Powell said that in New York the average amount of milk per cow per year from each cow is 3,000 pounds. He could take to mind, he said, dairy cows who secure as high as 10,000 to 15,000 pounds per year from each cow, as a result of using high-bred sires.

On the treatment and care of the cow, Mr. Powell said that the dairy cow should be properly handled, is a gold mine to the owner. The raising of the grade of stock in Minnesota in the near future will depend largely upon the selection of high-bred sires.

HARVEY'S ORDINANCE DECLARED O. K. BY JUDGE SMITH. A FAVORABLE DECISION.

The Street Railway Company Must Give Transfers at All Intersections of Its Lines—An Ordinance Is Not a Contract, but Merely a License Subject to Police Regulations.

Judge Seagrave Smith has handed down his decision in the Harvey transfer. It is a victory for the city, and the street railway company is defeated at every turn. The decision is a lengthy one. It holds that a mandamus is a proper remedy, and that an ordinance is not a contract, but a license.

The Harvey ordinance, which provides for transfers at all intersections of the street railway lines, is upheld by the court. The ordinance is declared to be a license, and not a contract.
