BOURES DIED FROM SHOCK

SUCH IS THE DECISION OF DOCTORS WHO MADE THE AUTOPSY.

HIS PHYSICAL CONDITION BAD.

Dr. McEachran Says the Enemy Consisted of a Quart of Water and Thirty Drops of Carbolic Acid, Well Stirred—Died a Few Minutes Afterward—Funeral This Morning.

An autopsy was held yesterday on the body of William H. Boures, who died suddenly Monday afternoon at the office of Dr. McEachran, on Seventh street.

The autopsy was conducted by Drs. Whitcomb, Finell and Richardson, and during its progress Drs. Millard, Quinn, Duwoudie, Bennepe, Poole, McEachran and Boie were in attendance. The post-mortem showed that the deceased had been troubled with heart and lung trouble, these organs being in a debilitated condition. His condition was such that any violent shock might have caused his death.

Coroner Whitcomb, after the autopsy, said death evidently resulted from a shock following the examination made by the physician. Dr. McEachran, seen last evening, said that he felt deeply for the young man's death, but he was conscientious in the matter and felt that he had done what he thought best from a medical standpoint.

The doctor said he had been located in St. Paul since Jan. 1. He was a graduate of the University of Michigan, and had practiced in the state for five years.

William H. Boures was connected with the general offices of the Ontario company since 1888, when he entered the service of Purchasing Agent Wright. In October, 1892, he was made general manager of the company. He was a warm and genial nature, and he possessed the confidence and esteem of all with whom he came in contact.

The funeral will take place this morning from St. Mary's church at 10:30. The pallbearers will be James Mand, William Gill, Samuel Bredt, James McMahon, Thomas Turnbull and William Riodes.

The Lindeke Funeral. F. W. Lindeke Jr., who died Sunday night, was buried yesterday. Brief services were held at the family residence, 67 East Fifth street, succeeded by formal services at St. John's Lutheran church at 2 p. m., which were largely attended.

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
