CROOKSTON, Minn., April 7.—The old city council met tonight to canvass the returns of the recent election. When they reached the fifth ward Ed Childs gave notice of contest of the seat of A. McGregor, who was elected by two votes over Childs as alderman. He claims that illegal votes were cast, and has already sworn out a warrant for the arrest of a man named Demers, who he claimed, had not lived in the ward the required length of time. The matter will be settled at an adjourned meeting to be held on Monday night.

JAMESTOWN, N. D., April 7.—In the city election today A. M. Halstead, a prominent young business man, candidate of the non-partisan citizen's convention, was elected mayor by a good majority over two other candidates, Col. Halstead was nominated by citizens generally, regardless of politics, as a rebuke to the Republicans, who attempted to run the entire city election. A stubborn fight was made in all wards and the gang downed.

FIREWORKS EXPLOSION.

SERIOUS FATALITY AT PETERSBURG SATURDAY P. M.

TEN MEN WERE KILLED.

Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, Several Prominent Business Men Among the Victims—The Explosions Were Heard a Mile Away—The Loss of Property is \$100,000.

PETERSBURG, Va., April 7.—Fully fifteen men were killed and half as many more wounded by an explosion of powder in the fireworks factory of Iomaine Bros., in this city, this afternoon, a few minutes before 3 o'clock. First notice of the explosion Charles N. Romaine, the senior member of the firm; John Bland, the senior member of the tobacco firm of Bland Bros. & Wright; Capt. James Tash, a prominent citizen, and Charles Bland were engaged for over an hour in the office of the fire works company.
