TRAIN SEIZED.

Deputy Marshals Aboard Couldn't Cope With the Mob. L. D. Foster, president of the American Railway Union of St. Cloud, who was brought to St. Paul Friday night by Marshal Bede, came to the city before United States Commissioner Spencer and returned to St. Cloud yesterday.

United States Commissioner Spencer issued a number of warrants yesterday for the arrest of strikers who are alleged to have been interfering with the trains. Great numbers of strikers, a big batch of chancery subpoenas and injunction notices, copies of which the deputy marshals are plentifully supplied with.

"None whatever. The company is not giving employment to any new men at present. Such a report is nonsensical."

"Is the company any special information to impact?"

"We are getting news of some kind all the time, of course, but not in such shape that we can give it tangible shape at present. I may have something definite to say this evening, but nothing now."
