The French government does not approve of the marriage of its diplomats to American girls, and has issued a decree prohibiting such alliances except by the permission of the secretary of foreign affairs.

SENATOR DAVIS' opposition to the granting of a subsidy to the Nicaragua canal will be generally approved by the people of this section, not because of the reasons he gives—the impracticability of retaining American control of the ditch—but on the general ground that it is no part of the policy or duty of this government to grant subsidies to enterprises maintained in foreign countries.

The importance of cleanliness is never more forcibly exemplified than at present, while the small-pox is epidemic in Chicago. Careful inquiry by the health department shows that 95 per cent of the cases have occurred in localities where the drainage is imperfect and the absence of lake water.

The consistency of the Republicans has never been remarkable in any matter, but in no respect has it been so conspicuous by its absence as in its discrimination between the classes bearing petitions to congress. Every delegation from the manufacturing districts that has arrived at the capital to protest against the passage of the Wilson bill has been welcomed with open arms and treated to sumptuous quarters.

But even the assurance which the missing word fails to reach has now been exceeded by brazenly unscrupulous and the imagination in characterization.

The Pioneer Press, actually, and in apparently sober earnest, asks for a continuance of the "reform administration," owing to its effective police services.

The hundreds of held-up, sandbagged and plundered citizens during the past two years will highly appreciate this argument.

Before "reform," life and property were safe in St. Paul, but now the citizen who ventures out of his home after dark must convert himself into a walking arsenal, and leave the results to God.

The city has been the home and rendezvous of the criminal classes, and criminal deeds have become so frequent that a systematic plan of suppression has been adopted to prevent the public knowing to what an alarming extent crime and the criminals flourish.

Protected gambling places, dividing their plunder with the police, bunco saloons, dice tables, dice tables, dice tables, highwaymen, murderers and every grade of criminality has flourished in St. Paul for two years past until the city is absolutely desolate of police protection.

It there is any one reason stronger than a hundred others why Robert A. Smith should be elected mayor, it is for the liberal reform of the present worthless, the positively criminal dereliction of the police service.

While the city is going on the Republican papers are fairly frantic in their stop-titled cries of fraud. The methods of the Doranites are as bold and fraudulent as those of Tim Reardon, who is a law unto himself in lawlessness.

THE QUESTION THAT IS NOW uppermost in the discussions of the Republican press is: Which has profited the most—McKinley by the indorsement of his tariff theories by the Democratic congress, or Reed by the partial indorsement of his tariff theories by the house?

The question interests Democrats only so far as indicating which of the two Republican leaders shall have advanced his chances of obtaining the presidential nomination of his party in 1908.

For some time past the contest has been narrowed down to these two men. Harrison is out of the question. He has permanently retired from public affairs, and even if he should feel the fires of ambition, he is too old to be a candidate.

As the author of the existing tariff law, McKinley has a permanent interest in the system now in vogue here, and the impression of his name, and, whether its results are good or evil, he cannot escape the credit or responsibility for them.

That those results have been evil is apparent on every side in the depressed condition of the country, and the distress in which trade and commerce are involved. Every workshop that is tenantless and silent is eloquent in protest against a system that was designed to protect and foster the interests of wealthy monopoly.

Mr. Reed's indorsement by the Democratic party is not as emphatic as is the apparent approval of McKinleyism. The speaker had something in compelling the Democratic party to indorse his tariff policy, and thereby give its indorsement to the statesmanship of McKinley, instead of blotting it forever from our statute books in accordance with the solemn promise of its representatives in the last Democratic national convention.
