THE TEXAN TALKS TARIFF.

A FIERY SPEECH FROM MR. MILLS GETS MUCH APPLAUSE.

CONGRATULATED BY SENATORS

The People Want the Tariff Bill Passed Before they Starve to Death, He Shouts—If Other Democratic Senators Shared His Opinion the Bill Would Be a Law in Forty-Eight Hours.

WASHINGTON, April 24.—There was a small number of visitors in the galleries of the senate when the vice president took his seat on this, the last day when the tariff bill will be passed before it is taken up for a vote.

On motion of Senator Pettigrew, the senate passed a bill to extend the time for building a bridge across the Missouri river at Yankton, S. D.

The morning hour having expired, the tariff bill was laid over until the afternoon when it is taken up for a vote.

Promptly at 1 o'clock Senator Mills took the floor. At the outset he declared that legislators often had to make an election between two parliamentary measures, neither of which merit their approval.

"This bill does not meet my approval," he said, "and I don't think it entirely meets the approval of any gentleman on this side of the chamber. But such as it is, it will have my hearty support."
