GRAND LODGE FIRST DAY.

OVER THREE HUNDRED DELEGATES FROM OVER THE STATE

PRESENT AT THE OPENING.

Matter of Reducing the Initiation Fee Laid Over for a Year, to Await Further Discussion in A. O. U. W. Papers—Much Work of Interest to the Order Was Transacted.

Yesterday was A. O. U. W. day in St. Paul. Monday night the delegates began to appear at the hotels, and yesterday morning's trains from all over the state arrived at the contingents to the grand lodge A. O. U. W.

The delegates are a representative body of people and include many of the most prominent business and professional men and politicians of the country.

A few minutes after 10 a. m. the event in the hands of Grand Master Workman

Porter called the members to order, and those who had not received the degree were conducted gently from the hall, only to return in a few minutes to receive the innermost secrets of the grand lodge.

The committee on credentials, Jacob Newhall, of Owatonna, C. A. Donaldson, of Minneapolis, and Joseph Leicht, of Owatonna, had done their work both rapidly and well, and no contests occurred.

The business of receiving and seating the members and reading of reports occupied the whole of the morning session, and at noon an adjournment was taken until 2 o'clock.

The reports of the grand officers were received during the year. The total amount paid out of the general fund during the fiscal year was \$18,553.61, as against \$13,691.70 last year, an increase of \$5,161.82.

The present condition of the grand lodge is most favorable, and a larger interest is manifested than has been the case for some time.

At 2 o'clock, when the afternoon session began, the lodge settled down to active business, with hardly a delegate missing from his seat.

The builders have every reason to be proud of their efforts, for no lake in this vicinity can boast of a finer piece of work for its size than "The Lady of the Lake."


